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The American College Teacher: National Norms for the 1998–99 HERI Faculty Survey

This report summarizes the highlights of a national survey of college and university faculty that was conducted by the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) in the fall and winter of 1998–99. This is the fourth in a series of faculty surveys conducted on a triennial basis, the first of which was conducted in 1989–90. The results of the first of this series of survey projects are reported in Astin, Korn, and Dey (1991).

The results reported here are based on the responses of 33,785 full-time college and university faculty members at 378 two-year colleges, four-year colleges, and universities nationwide. For this report, 'faculty member' is defined as any full-time employee of an accredited college or university who spends at least part of his or her time teaching undergraduates.* The responses were weighted to provide a normative profile of the American faculty population for use by individuals engaged in policy analysis, campus administration, and educational research. Details of the weighting procedure, as well as other methodological issues, can be found in Appendix A.

The normative data presented here are reported separately for men and women and for 12 different institutional groupings. The stratifying factors are institutional control (public, private-nonsectarian, Catholic and Protestant) and type (university, four-year college, two-year college).

The Survey Instrument

The survey questionnaire was based largely on the instruments used in the three previous surveys, and was revised on the basis of suggestions from our advisory board and researchers who are actively involved in studying faculty issues. In addition to demographic and biographic information, the revised questionnaire focuses heavily on issues such as how faculty members spend their time, how they interact with students, their preferred methods of teaching and examining students, their perceptions of the institutional climate, and their primary sources of stress and satisfaction. The 1998-99 instrument also includes one dozen new items related to faculty's experiences with information technology. Finally, the instrument includes a section allowing individual institutions to ask their faculty members a set of up to ten locally—developed questions. (See Appendix B for a copy of the survey instrument.)

^{*}Although surveys were also received from academic administrators and other types of respondents, only those who spend at least some time teaching undergraduates are included in the results reported here.

AN OVERVIEW OF THE 1998-99 FACULTY NORMS

Complete results of the 1998–99 faculty survey, reported separately for all faculty, male faculty, and female faculty are provided later in this report. In this section we have abstracted highlights of these results for discussion and interpretation. For purposes of comparison, this section includes selected normative results from earlier HERI faculty surveys (see Astin, Korn, & Dey, 1991; Sax, Astin, Arredondo, and Korn, 1996). Results are presented on the following topics: background characteristics, information technology, tenure attitudes, faculty diversity, academic climate, community service and social activism, and gender equity.

Background Characteristics

Demographic and background characteristics of the faculty are shown in Table 1. Continuing a trend reported in previous faculty surveys, the much-discussed aging of American college and university faculty is demonstrated clearly by the results: 32 percent of all faculty are 55 or older (compared with 24 percent in 1989), while the percent who are younger than 45 has declined from 41 percent in 1989 to 34 percent today.

Faculty aging is also reflected in the number of years faculty have been at their present institutions. The percent of faculty who have been at their college or university for over 28 years has increased from 6 percent to 15 percent since 1989. Nevertheless, the percent of "new entrants" (faculty who have been at their institution for seven years or less) has changed little since 1989 (38 percent in 1998, compared with 37 percent in 1989), suggesting that faculty hiring has continued steadily over the past decade.

Table 1 also shows an increase in the percent of faculty who hold doctoral degrees (65 percent in 1998, compared with 61 percent in 1989), with a corresponding decrease in the percent of faculty whose highest degree is the master's.

Finally, the gender composition of American faculty has changed significantly over the past decade, although women continue to remain a minority. Presently, 36 percent of faculty are women, compared with 29 percent in 1989.



Information Technology Produces Stress for Faculty

Two-thirds of college and university faculty (67 percent) report that "keeping up with information technology" has proved to be stressful for them during the past two years. Information technology is the fourth most frequently cited source of stress among women (74 percent) and the fifth most frequently cited among men (64 percent), ranking for both groups above other sources of stress such as research and publishing demands (50 percent), teaching load (62 percent), and the review and promotion process (46 percent). However, despite technology's role as a stress-producer, the vast majority of faculty believe that computers are educationally beneficial: A full 87 percent of faculty agree that "student use of computers enhances their learning."

The level of stress resulting from information technology is quite likely a reflection of the time faculty invest in it. As shown in Figure 1, 87 percent of all faculty communicate via e-mail


at least twice a week, and 85 percent regularly use computers to write memos or letters. Faculty also use computers on a regular basis to work from home (55 percent); conduct scholarly writing (54 percent); create presentations (38 percent); conduct research using Internet resources (35 percent); and conduct data analysis (27 percent). In addition, 36 percent of faculty place or collect course assignments on the Internet, and 22 percent use computers in undergraduate course instruction. Nevertheless, only a minority of faculty (11 percent) use the computer to participate in on-line discussion groups, and only 2 percent have taught a course exclusively through the Internet.



Younger faculty are much more likely than older faculty to use computers on a regular basis (see Table 2). The largest age differences in computing relate to some of the more "interactive" uses of the computer: to communicate via e-mail and to conduct research using Internet resources. Older faculty also experience more stress related to information technology: among faculty who are 45 or older, more than two-thirds are stressed about keeping up with technology, compared with less than half of the faculty who are younger than 35 (see Figure 2). Therefore, even though older faculty are less likely than younger faculty to use computers, information technology causes them even more stress.

Faculty Increasingly Support Tenure

Perhaps as a backlash against recent challenges to the tenure system, faculty support for tenure is on the rise. Table 3 shows how tenure attitudes have changed among tenured and untenured faculty since the most recent HERI faculty survey was conducted in 1995. Both tenured and untenured faculty of all ranks increasingly <u>disagree</u> with the statement, "Tenure is an outmoded concept," and increasingly agree that "Tenure is essential to attract the best minds to academe." Still, the most ardent supporters of tenure continue to be those faculty who have already earned it, particularly those at the higher ranks. The greatest opposition to tenure comes from the most highly ranked untenured faculty (i.e., those with perhaps the least chance of gaining tenure).

Faculty Diversity at a Standstill

Faculty at American colleges and universities remain predominantly white, with little change in faculty diversity occurring over the past decade. As shown in Table 4, a full 91.7 percent of today's faculty are White/Caucasian, compared with 90.4 percent of faculty in 1989. Also shown in Table 4 is the low percentage of minority faculty among recent faculty hires, suggesting that institutions are making little headway in diversifying their faculty. In fact, survey results show a decline in the percentage of faculty who believe that their institution places a priority on hiring more minority faculty and administrators (42 percent, down from 47 percent in 1989). The sluggish pace of diversifying the faculty is no doubt a reflection of continued minority underrepresentation among doctoral degree recipients: While African Americans, Asian Americans, Hispanics, and American Indians presently earn 19 percent of all bachelor's degrees, they earn only 12 percent of doctoral degrees (National Center for Education Statistics, 1998).

When it comes to student diversity, the faculty themselves appear increasingly supportive. The percent of faculty who agree somewhat or strongly that "promoting diversity leads to the admission of too many underprepared students" has declined to 28 percent, from 31 percent in 1995. Further, the vast majority of faculty (91 percent) believe that "a racially/ethnically diverse student body enhances the educational experience of all students."





Improved Academic Climate for Faculty

During the past decade, faculty have developed more favorable attitudes toward their jobs, their colleagues, and their institutions as a whole (see Figure 3). Currently, 75 percent of faculty are satisfied with their jobs (up from 69 percent in 1989); 74 percent are satisfied with the competency of their colleagues (up from 68 percent); 72 percent are satisfied with their working conditions (up from 65 percent); and 58 percent are satisfied with their relations with the administration (up from 52 percent). Faculty today are also more likely to believe that other faculty "are committed to the welfare of this institution" (85 percent, up from 76 percent in 1989); are "strongly interested in the academic problems of undergraduates" (82 percent, up from 76 percent); are "easy to see...outside of regular office hours" (44 percent, up from 34 percent); and "respect each other" (36 percent, up from 32 percent). Further, increasing numbers of faculty believe that their institution is committed to developing "a sense of community among students and faculty" (47 percent, up from 41 percent in 1989).

However, while faculty have become more satisfied professionally, they have faced increasing pressures in their personal lives. As compared with faculty in 1989, today's faculty are more likely to experience stress due to: household responsibilities (71 percent, up from 64 percent); their physical health (48 percent, up from 38 percent); and caring for elderly parents (34 percent, up from 26 percent) (see Figure 4). The latter two results are no doubt a reflection of faculty aging, as described earlier.





Community Service and Social Activism

Faculty are increasingly likely to believe that American colleges and universities are committed to involving students in community service (see Table 5). Between 1989 and 1998, the percent of faculty who believe that their institution places a priority on facilitating student involvement in community service has grown from 23 to 36 percent. Over the same time period, a growing number of faculty believe that their institution is committed to helping students "learn how to bring about change in American society" (27 percent, up from 21 percent in 1989). These trends are also reflected in faculty responses to items introduced to the survey in 1995: The number of faculty who believe that "many courses involve students in community service" has grown from 26 to 30 percent, and the number believing that "many students are strongly committed to community service" has grown from 22 to 26 percent.

Despite the faculty's growing awareness of their institution's commitment to community service, such trends are not evident with respect to the faculty's <u>personal</u> commitment to community service and social activism. Since 1989, a declining percentage of faculty are personally committed to such goals as influencing the political structure, influencing social values, and cleaning up the environment (see Table 6). And although 54 percent of faculty believe that "community service should be given weight in college admissions" (up from 47 percent in 1995), there has been essentially no change in faculty's own commitment to "instill in students a commitment to community service" and to "prepare students for responsible citizenship." The apparent contradiction between a growing awareness of community service at the institutional level and a stagnant or declining commitment to service at the individual level may be a reflection of the heightened attention that the service movement has received in recent years. In other words, faculty are increasingly aware of community service efforts on their campus, but they have yet to become more personally involved with such activities.

Moderate Gains in Gender Equity

The 1998-99 faculty survey suggests that while women have come closer to achieving gender equity in academe, they nevertheless remain in the lower ranks of power, pay, and research productivity. Further, women continue to face significant personal and professional obstacles in their academic careers.

Position

As noted earlier, women constitute an increasing share of faculty nationwide. Women in fact have become more highly represented at nearly all types of institutions and are significantly more likely than men are to be among "recent hires" (49 percent of women have been hired within the past seven years, compared with 33 percent among men). Further, an increasing

number of faculty women serve in the rank of full professor (20 percent, up from 16 percent in 1989) and associate professor (25 percent, up from 23 percent in 1989). Nevertheless, as demonstrated in Table 7, women faculty continue to remain underrepresented in the most prestigious institutions—the public and private research universities—and overrepresented in the public and private two-year colleges. Women also continue to serve in the lower academic ranks more often than do men, as 25 percent of women are instructors or lecturers (compared to 13 percent of men), and 29 percent are assistant professors (compared to 18 percent of men). Similarly, men are twice as likely as women are to hold the rank of full professor (41 percent of men, 20 percent of women). Women are also less likely to be tenured than are men (43 percent of women, 63 percent of men).

Salary

Table 8 displays faculty salaries in 1998 and 1989 (adjusted to 1998 dollars) for men and women across different academic ranks. In the 1998-99 academic year, women faculty earned approximately 81 cents for every dollar earned by male faculty, resulting in a gender gap significantly smaller than that which exists for most other occupations (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1997). When broken down by academic rank, women's salaries come much closer to men's, with women earning between 91 and 95 cents for every dollar earned by men in the same rank. While these figures suggest that gender equity in salary has nearly been achieved, it is important to note that even a small difference in annual salary makes a substantial difference in income earned over the span of a career. For example, a difference of only \$1,000 in current

annual salary makes a difference of approximately \$85,000 over a 40-year career (assuming annual 3.5 percent salary increases), and a difference of over \$200,000 if the "lost income" was invested annually in an account generating 5 percent interest (Haignere, Lin, Eisenberg, & McCarthy, 1996).

Research Productivity

Over the last decade, women faculty have become increasingly productive in their research. The percentage of women who have had "professional writings published or accepted for publication in the last two years" reached 52 percent in 1998, up from 44 percent in 1989. Although research productivity is also on the rise for men, gains have been larger for women, resulting in an overall narrowing of the longstanding gender gap in scholarly productivity. As shown in Table 9, the reduction in the gender gap over the past decade has occurred mainly at the lower levels of productivity (0-4 publications), and particularly at the assistant professor level. The gender gap remains relatively unchanged at higher levels of productivity (5 or more publications in the past two years).

Academic Climate for Women

In terms of the climate for women faculty, there is some good news: Significantly fewer women experience stress from "subtle discrimination" today as compared to a decade ago (35 percent in 1998, down from 48 percent in 1989). Nevertheless, women remain more stressed about subtle discrimination than do men, with 17 percent of men reporting such stress. Additional results also reflect workplace challenges faced by women faculty, with women more likely than men to experience stress resulting from the review and promotion process (52 percent among women, 43 percent among men), more likely to be sexually harassed at their institution (10 percent among women, 3 percent among men), and more likely to consider leaving academe for another job (39 percent among women, 33 percent among men). Further, women are less likely than men are to believe that female faculty at their institution are treated fairly (74 percent among women, 91 percent among men), and are less likely to be satisfied with job security (68 percent among women, 78 percent among men).

Adding to the challenges women faculty face on the job are the many pressures they face in their personal lives. Though male and female faculty members tend to have roughly the same number of children, women are more likely than men are to interrupt their career for health or family reasons (29 percent among women, 6 percent among men), to experience stress from managing household and child care responsibilities (81 percent among women, 66 percent among men), and to spend at least seventeen hours per week tending to household and child care responsibilities (31 percent among women, 15 percent among men). Given these results, it is perhaps not surprising that women are also more likely than men are to experience stress due to the "lack of personal time" (88 percent of women, 75 percent of men).

Summary

This report is based on survey data collected in 1998-99 from a national sample of 33,785 faculty members at 378 colleges, universities, and community colleges. Data have been weighted to approximate the results that would have been obtained if all college faculty in all accredited institutions across the country had responded. Following are some of the survey highlights:

- Two-thirds of faculty feel that keeping up with information technology is a significant source of stress, a finding that is likely linked to the high level of computer use reported among faculty: The vast majority regularly use the computer for correspondence, and over half use computers on a regular basis to conduct scholarly writing and to work from home.
- Regardless of tenure status, faculty of all ranks have become increasingly supportive
 of tenure in recent years. Not surprisingly, the strongest advocates for the tenure
 system are the most highly ranked tenured faculty.
- Despite an increasingly diverse student population, faculty at American colleges and
 universities remain predominantly white. The consistently low minority
 representation among recent faculty hires suggests that institutions are not making
 significant progress toward diversifying the professoriate.

- While a growing number of faculty perceive their institutions as being committed to community service and social activism, such gains are not evident with respect to the faculty's <u>own</u> goals and commitments.
- During the past decade, faculty have developed more favorable attitudes toward their
 jobs, their colleagues, and their institutions. However, improvements in the academic
 climate have been accompanied by increasing pressures faced by faculty in their
 personal lives: managing household responsibilities, caring for elderly parents, and
 their own physical health.
- Despite gains made by faculty women in terms of position, salary, and scholarly productivity, gender disparities persist in each of these areas. Additionally, women's perception of the academic climate remains less favorable than men's perception, particularly with respect to their experiences with discrimination, the review and promotion process, and job security. Faculty women also continue to face significant demands on their personal time, most notably due to household and child care responsibilities.

Research Methodology

Administering the Survey

Letters of invitation to participate in the survey were sent to the chief academic and institutional research officers at more than 2,600 institutions nationwide. Of the total population of institutions that were invited, 364 institutions agreed to administer the survey. Each participating institution then provided HERI with the names and addresses of those persons that the institution wanted surveyed. The great majority of the persons were full-time faculty. However, some institutions also chose to survey their academic administrators or persons with academic appointments but no teaching duties. (To secure a reliable set of normative data, HERI developed an algorithm for determining respondent type – See "Defining Faculty Groups", below.)

HERI then prepared a survey packet for each potential respondent, including a copy of the survey instrument, a cover letter from the Institute, and a pre-paid return envelope. The packets were then mailed to each institution, which had the option to add a cover letter of its own, as well as instructions for up to 20 locally-designed questions. The packets were then mailed by each institution to its faculty.

After approximately eight weeks, HERI's processing center inspected the returned surveys and identified who had not responded. A second set of survey packets was prepared for the non-respondents and distributed to the institutions, where the mail-out process was repeated. After an additional ten weeks, all surveys were processed and the resulting data file sent to HERI for analysis.

As in previous administrations of the Faculty Survey, the distribution of participating institutions by type and control was uneven, with small private colleges more likely to participate than large public colleges and universities. To compensate for this imbalance, HERI conducted a direct administration of the survey to faculty at a supplemental sample of 65 institutions. Names and addresses for potential respondents were obtained from a company specializing in mailings to college faculty. Survey packets were prepared and distributed directly from HERI's processing center using the same two-wave administration process noted above. Because the survey packets did not include a cover letter from the institution, it was expected that the response rate would be somewhat lower for these institutions (as it was, see below).

The National Normative Sample

For an institution's data to be included in the normative sample, HERI required that a minimum percentage of all faculty at that institution be surveyed. Total full-time faculty counts were obtained from the 1997 IPEDS Faculty Salary and Tenure survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Education. Participating two- and four-year colleges were required to have surveyed at least 35 percent of their full-time faculty. Participating universities were required to survey at least 25 percent. To reflect the lower response rate from the supplemental sample of institutions, the minimum percentage was five points lower (30 and 20 percent respectively).

As a result of these requirements, results from 43 of the 364 participating institutions and 8 of the 65 supplemental institutions were dropped from the normative sample, leaving a total of 378.

Inclusion in the normative sample should not be confused with response rate. An institution's response rate depends on the number of *sampled* faculty who returned surveys. If the institution sampled only a small proportion of its full-time undergraduate faculty, it might not meet the norms requirements even if it had a very high response rate.

Weighting Procedures

In order to approximate as closely as possible the results that would have been obtained if all college and university teaching faculty in all institutions had responded to the survey, a multistage weighting procedure was employed following Astin, Korn, and Dey (1991). The first set of weights was designed to adjust for response bias within participating institutions. The entire faculty at each institution was sorted into twelve categories representing all combinations of gender (male or female) and rank (professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, other). The ratio between the total number of faculty in the institution and the number of respondents in each category was used as the first corrective weight. Thus, if there were 20 female full professors and 10 of those responded, each of these respondent's weights would be 2.0 (20 divided by 10). This within–institution weight, which is designed to correct for any response bias related to the gender or rank of the faculty member, adjusts the total number of respondents up to the total number of faculty at the institution.²

To develop the second set of weights, institutions were sorted into 23 stratification cells based upon type (two-year, four-year, university), control (public, private-nonsectarian, Roman

¹ Universities faced a less stringent requirement because the IPEDS survey does not distinguish between undergraduate and graduate faculty. Since the Faculty Survey focuses on undergraduate faculty, total faculty counts for universities are inflated.

Catholic, Protestant), and, for four-year institutions, selectivity (defined as the average admissions test score of the entering freshman class). Within each of these stratification cells, faculty in all institutions in the population were sorted into the same 12 gender-by-rank categories described above. Data from all participating institutions within each institutional stratification cell were then combined, and the weighted number of respondents (using the first weight described above) was then determined separately for each of the gender-by-rank combinations. Thus, for each gender-by-rank combination within a stratification cell, we had two values: the total number of faculty in the higher education population, and the weighted number of respondents to our survey. The ratio between these two totals became the second weight, which was designed to correct for between-stratification cell differences in institutional participation. The final weight used for each respondent consisted of the product of the two weights (that is, the within-institution weight and the between-stratification weight).

Table A1 shows the total number of institutions and total number of institutional participants by institutional type, together with the total number of faculty members, faculty surveyed, and faculty respondents for each cell.

Survey Response

Of the 128,034 questionnaires mailed out, usable returns were eventually received from 55,081, constituting a 43 percent response rate for all institutions. As expected, the response rate for participating institutions was somewhat higher (46 percent) while the rate for institutions in the supplemental sample was considerably lower (30 percent).

These response rates are somewhat higher than those for the 1995-96 administration (42 and 28 percent respectively). We believe that this movement counter to the general decline in response to mail-out surveys (see Dey, 1997) might have to do with a change made in the administration process. Up through 1995-96, the respondent's name and address were printed directly on the survey instrument, which typically resulted in a large number of complaints about privacy issues. For the 1998-99 administration, the name and address were removed from the instrument and placed on a separate mailing label. Nonetheless, the overall response rate is still considerably lower than the 55 percent achieved in the 1989-90 administration.

Defining Faculty Groups

As already noted, only those full-time employees who were engaged in teaching undergraduates were included in the normative data reported here. Full-time administrators, full-time researchers, or faculty members who teach <u>only</u> at the postgraduate level have been excluded. Specifically, a respondent was included in the normative data if one of the following conditions was met:

- 1) if he or she indicated full-time employment at an institution [question 2] <u>and</u> noted teaching as his/her principal activity [question 1] <u>and</u> either
 - a) taught at least one undergraduate-level course [question 19] or
 - b) taught no classes at all in the most recent term (this last condition is included for faculty on sabbatical leave or those currently engaged in research full-time).
- 2) if he or she indicated full-time employment at an institution [question 2] <u>and</u> taught at least two courses in the last term [question 19], at least one of which was at the undergraduate level.
- 3) if he or she indicated full-time employment at an institution [question 2] <u>and</u> indicated that he/she spent at least 9 hours per week in scheduled teaching [question 18], but did not indicate any specific types of courses being taught [question 19].

Comparability Issues

Caution should be exercised when making comparisons between results from the 1998-99 faculty survey and earlier surveys for three questions.

Number of Children (Question #10)

Generally, the percentages reported in HERI reports are based on the number of "non-missing" cases—that is, cases for which some sort of response was made. This procedure was used for the "Number of Children" question in previous years.

However, in 1998 it became clear that a substantial number of people who were not making any response to a particular age range should have marked the "0" bubble for that range. Accordingly, any such instances were changed from "missing" to "none" for the purposes of this report. This had the effect of increasing the percentage of the "none" response while lowering the percentages for all other responses.

Published or Accepted Professional Writings (Question #24)

In 1989 and 1998, this question asked "How many of your professional writings have been published or accepted for publication in the last two years?" By contrast, the question read "How many professional writings/performances have you published or presented in the last two years?" in 1995, and "How many of your professional writings/performances have been published or presented in the last two years?" in 1992. As a result, comparable years are 1989 and 1998 only.

Evaluation/Instructional Methods (Question #35)

In 1989 and 1992, the question read "In how many of the undergraduate courses that you teach do you <u>require</u> each of the following?" In 1995 and 1998, the question read "In how many of the undergraduate courses that you teach do you <u>use</u> each of the following?" This change resulted in substantial increases in the percentages of faculty responding "some," "most" or "all". Accordingly, the 1998 results are comparable to 1995, but not to earlier years.

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Appendix C

The Precision of the Normative Data

A common question asked about sample surveys relates to the precision of the data, which is typically reported as the accuracy of a percentage "plus or minus x percentage points." This figure, which is known as a confidence interval, can be estimated for items of interest if one knows the response percentage and its standard error.

Given the large normative sample, the calculated standard error associated with any particular response percentage will be small (as will its confidence interval). It is important to note, however, that traditional methods of calculating standard error assume conditions which, as is the case with most sample survey data, do not apply here. There are also sources of error unrelated to sampling variability which should be considered in comparing data across normative groups, across related item categories, and over time. These concerns include:

- 1) Traditional methods of calculating standard error assume that the analytical sample was selected through simple random sampling. Given the complex, stratified design of this survey, where the normative estimates are based on responses of faculty at participating institutions, it is likely that the actual standard errors will be somewhat larger than the standard error estimates produced through traditional computational methods.
- 2) The wording of some questions in the survey instrument, the text and number of response options, and their order of presentation may be different for different faculty surveys. We have found that even small changes can produce large order and context effects. Given this, the <u>exact</u> wording of items on the survey instrument should be examined carefully prior to making comparisons across survey years (for a copy of the 1998-99 survey instrument, see Appendix B).

Although it is impractical to report statistical indicators for every percentage in every normative group, it is important for those who are interested to be able to estimate the precision of the data. Toward this end, Table C1 provides estimates of standard errors for norms groups of various sizes and for different percentages, while Table C2 provides confidence interval estimates.

For example, the normative data indicates that 21.9 percent of all faculty reported that they had conducted research/writing on race/ethnicity within the past two years. To obtain an

estimate of the standard error¹, we would first choose the column that most closely corresponds to that percentage, or "20%".² Next, select the row corresponding most closely to the unweighted sample size of the comparison group to find the appropriate standard error. The last column in Table A1 shows that the unweighted number of faculty from all institutions is 33,785. Thus, with a sample size of about 35,000 and a percentage that is close to 20, the estimated standard error would be .21.

To obtain an estimate of the confidence interval at the 95% probability level, follow a similar procedure to look up the correct value in Table C2. We would again use the value in the fifth data column ("20%") in the last row, or .4. In practical terms, this confidence interval means that if we were to replicate this survey a number of times, we would expect to find that 95 times out of 100 between 21.5 percent and 22.3 percent of the faculty would report conducting research/writing on race/ethnicity within the past two years.

¹Calculated by $\sqrt{\frac{x\%(100-x\%)}{N}}$, where x is the percentage of interest and N is the population count from Table A1.

 $^{^2}$ Since the distribution of the standard errors are symmetrical around the 50 percent mid-point, for percentages over 50 simply subtract the percentage from 100 and use the result to select the appropriate column. For example, if the percentage we were interested in was 59, 100 - 59 percent yields 41, so we would use the column labeled '40%'.

Determining the Significance of Differences between Percentages

Normally, confidence intervals are used to determine if the difference between two percentages is statistically significant. As an example, let us assume that a private university surveyed 455 of its faculty and found that 30.0 percent conducted research/writing on race/ethnicity in the last two years. Is this percentage significantly higher than the 25.8 percent reported for all private universities (n=4,138)? To determine this, one must perform the following three steps:

- 1) DETERMINE THE CONFIDENCE INTERVAL FOR EACH PERCENTAGE.
- 2) ADD THE CONFIDENCE INTERVALS TOGETHER.
- 3) Is the sum of the confidence intervals more or less than the difference? If it is more, then the difference is **not** statistically significant. If the sum of the confidence intervals is less than the difference, the difference is statistically significant.

Applying these steps to our example, we find:

1) Consulting Table C2, the confidence interval for the 30.0 percent figure ("sample private university") is **4.0** (the 30% column for a sample size of 500), and the confidence interval for

the 25.8 percent figure ("all private universities") is **1.3** (the 25% column for a sample size of 4,000).

- 2) 4.0 + 1.3 = 5.3
- 3) The sum of the confidence intervals is **larger** than the difference between the percentages (30.0 25.8 = 4.2), so the difference is **not** statistically significant.

Why is this so? With a confidence interval of 4.0, we know that there is a 95% probability that the "sample university" figure (reported as 30.0) is within the range 26.0-34.0. We also know that there is a 95% probability that the "all private universities" figure (reported as 25.8) is within the range 24.5-27.1. Because the ranges for the two figures overlap, we cannot presume that the difference between them is statistically significant. For the difference to be statistically significant, the figure reported for our sample university would need to be at least 31.2 percent.

Participants in the HERI Faculty Surveys 1989 - 1998

The following list shows the institutions participating in the four Faculty Surveys conducted since 1989. A participation status of 'P' indicates that the institution did participate, but was not included in the national normative sample. A participation status of 'N' indicates that the institution was included. An asterisk (*) indicates that the institution was included in the survey as part of a supplemental sample by the Higher Education Research Institute, and was not an active participant. The respondent pool for these schools was obtained from mailing lists provided by a direct-mail company specializing in higher education clients, and the surveys were mailed directly from the Institute.

Norms Status and Response Rate

Determination of whether or not an institution was included in the national normative sample was accomplished by comparing the number of full-time undergraduate teachers who responded to the survey to the total number of full-time faculty at that institution, according to the latest available data from the U.S. Department of Education. (DOE data generally run behind the survey year. Thus, the counts for the 1998 survey were based on DOE data from 1997.) A two-year or four-year college was included if it had surveyed at least 35 percent of its total population of full-time faculty. Because the DOE data do not distinguish between undergraduate and graduate faculty, the requirement for universities was more liberal -- at least 25 percent of the full-time faculty.
