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# The American College Teacher: National Norms for the 2001–02 HERI Faculty Survey

This report summarizes the highlights of a national survey of college and university faculty that was conducted by the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) in the fall and winter of 2001–02. This is the fifth in a series of faculty surveys conducted on a triennial basis, the first of which was conducted in 1989–90.

The results reported here are based on the responses of 32,840 full-time college and university faculty members at 358 two-year colleges, four-year colleges, and universities nationwide. For this report, "faculty member" is defined as any full-time employee of an accredited college or university who spends at least part of his or her time teaching undergraduates.\* The responses are weighted to provide a normative profile of the American faculty population for use by individuals engaged in policy analysis, campus administration, and educational research. Details of the weighting procedure, as well as other methodological issues, can be found in Appendix A.

The normative data presented here are reported separately for men and women and for 12 different institutional groupings. The stratifying factors are institutional control (public, private, non-sectarian, Catholic, and Protestant) and type (university, four-year college, and two-year college).

#### **The Survey Instrument**

The survey questionnaire was based largely on the instruments used in the four previous surveys, and was revised on the basis of suggestions from our advisory board and researchers who are actively involved in studying faculty issues. In addition to the demographic and biographic information, the revised questionnaire focuses heavily on issues such as how faculty members spend their time, how they interact with their students, their preferred methods of teaching and examining students, their perceptions of institutional climate, and their primary sources of stress and satisfaction. The 2001–02 instrument also includes new items related to vocational decision-making, including faculty's primary reasons for accepting employment at their present college or university. Finally, the instrument includes a section that allows individual institutions to ask their faculty members up to twenty-one locally-developed questions. (See Appendix B for a copy of the survey instrument.)

#### AN OVERVIEW OF THE 2001-02 FACULTY NORMS

Complete results of the faculty survey, reported separately for all faculty, male faculty, and female faculty are provided later in this report. In this section we have abstracted highlights of these results for discussion and interpretation. For purposes of comparison, this section includes selected normative results from earlier HERI faculty surveys (see Astin, Korn, and Dey, 1991; Sax, Astin, Arredondo, and Korn, 1996; Sax, Astin, Korn, and Gilmartin, 1999). Results are presented on the following topics: background characteristics, views about undergraduate education, instructional and evaluation methods, tenure attitudes, diversity issues, institutional work life, personal goals, and affective reactions to work.

#### **Background Characteristics**

Demographic and background characteristics of the faculty are shown in Table 1. Continuing a trend reported in previous faculty surveys, the much-discussed aging of American college and university faculty is demonstrated clearly by the results: 36 percent of all faculty are 55 or older (compared with 24 percent in 1989). The percentage who are younger than 45 has declined from 41 percent in 1989 to 30 percent today, with just 8 percent who are younger than 35.

Faculty aging is also reflected in the number of years faculty have worked at their present institutions. The percentage of faculty who have been at their college or university for over 28 years has increased from 6 percent to 14 percent since 1989. Meanwhile, the percentage of "new entrants" (faculty who have been at their institution for seven years or less) has changed little since 1989 (40 percent in 2001, compared with 37 percent in 1989), suggesting that faculty hiring has continued steadily over the past dozen years. However, among new entrants, the slight increase in faculty appointed to their current position within the last two years (21 percent in 2001, compared with 18 percent in 1998) reflects the first notable increase in over a decade and may signal the beginning of a reversal in this trend as large numbers of senior faculty continue to retire.

Table 1 also shows an increase over time in the percentage of faculty who hold doctoral (Ph.D. or Ed.D.) degrees (64 percent in 2001, compared with 61 percent in 1989) and a decrease in the percentage whose highest degree is the master's. Most notably, between 1989 and 2001, the percentage of women with doctoral degrees increased at three times the rate of men.

The gender composition of American faculty has changed significantly over the past twelve years, although women continue to remain a minority. Presently, 38 percent of faculty are women, compared with 29 percent in 1989. As shown in Table 2, women faculty continue to remain underrepresented in the most prestigious institutions—public and private research universities—and overrepresented in two-year colleges.

Finally, as shown in Table 3, there has been increasing polarization over the years in faculty political views. In 2001, 34 percent of faculty identify as "middle-of-the-road" politically (down from 40 percent in 1989). In particular, over the last twelve years there has been a disproportionate movement toward "liberal" or "far left" political views among women faculty. In 2001, 54 percent of women indicate liberal or far left political orientations (up from 45 percent in 1989), while 44 percent of men identify as politically liberal or far left (up from 41 percent in 1989).



#### Faculty Perspectives on Undergraduate Education at the Start of the New Millennium

Compared with faculty in 1989, today's faculty indicate greater attentiveness to students' well-being (Figure 1). For example, faculty are more likely to view their institutional colleagues as being interested in students' academic problems (83 percent, up from 76 percent) and personal problems (78 percent, up from 74 percent). Moreover, 46 percent of faculty feel that it is easy for students to see faculty outside of their office hours (up from 34 percent in 1989).

Since 1995, faculty perceptions of students' academic preparation has also improved. Nevertheless, just 32 percent of today's faculty feel that students at their institution are well-prepared academically (up from 28 percent in 1998 and a low of 24 percent in 1995).



Over the last dozen years, the greatest shift in faculty goals for undergraduate students has been in the emphasis they place on students' professional development. Preparing students for employment is viewed as a "very important" or "essential" endeavor by 70 percent of today's faculty (up from 62 percent in 1989), while preparing students for graduate education is valued by 56 percent of today's faculty (up from 51 percent in 1989). There has been little change in the degree of emphasis faculty place on preparing students for either of these post-college activities since the mid- to late-1990s. However, faculty in 2001 are comparatively more likely than faculty in the 1980s or 1990s to believe that the chief benefit of a college education is that it increases students' earning power (30 percent, versus 27 percent in 1998, and 25 percent in 1989).

Despite some notable changes over time in faculty perspectives on the professional development aspect of undergraduate education, the emphasis they place on undergraduate students' civic engagement has remained relatively constant since the mid-1990s. For example, since questions on civic engagement were first added to the survey in 1995, there has been little measurable change in the *personal* value faculty place on instilling within students a commitment to community service. Today, 37 percent of faculty view this as a "very important" or "essential" goal for undergraduates, relative to 35 percent in 1995. Similarly, 61 percent of faculty continue to place high priority on preparing students for responsible citizenship.

#### Faculty Increase Use of Student-Centered Instructional and Evaluation Methods

Faculty preferences for selected instructional and evaluation methods are shown in Table 4. In 2001, class discussions remain the most prevalent instructional technique, used by 72 percent of faculty in "all" or "most" of their courses. However, compared with their counterparts in previous years, faculty today use a wider variety of teaching methods.

The greatest change is in the use of computer and machine-aided instruction (30 percent, up from 19 percent in 1995). Since 1998, when questions specifically related to web-based instruction were first asked, there has been a notable increase in the number of faculty who place and collect assignments on the internet (50 percent, up from 36 percent), and those who have taught a course exclusively on the internet (9 percent, up from 2 percent).

Compared with 1995 faculty, today's faculty are also more likely to use collaborative instructional methods such as cooperative learning (41 percent, up from 35 percent) and group projects (27 percent, up from 23 percent). Faculty are also incorporating more writing activities across the undergraduate curriculum, evidenced by their increased use of essay exams (42 percent, up from 40 percent), short-answer exams (37 percent, up from 33 percent), term/research papers (37 percent, up from 33 percent), and weekly essay assignments (19 percent, up from 16 percent) to

evaluate student learning. Student presentations are an increasingly popular form of evaluation as well, used in "all" or "most" classes by 36 percent of faculty (up from 31 percent). Although both men and women faculty have broadened their teaching and evaluation methods over time, men remain more likely to use extensive lecturing, and women continue to be more likely to use "student-centered" instructional and evaluation methods (Figure 2).

While faculty are using a greater variety of instructional and evaluation methods, the amount of time they spend both preparing to teach and engaging in scheduled teaching has remained relatively unchanged. Faculty in 2001 spend, on average, 11 hours per week on scheduled teaching and 13 hours per week preparing to teach.

Today, 86 percent of faculty feel their teaching is valued by other faculty in their departments. Moreover, 42 percent have received an award for outstanding teaching (up from 40 percent in 1998 and 31 percent in 1989). The number of faculty who feel that their institution *rewards* good teaching has also increased (from 10 percent in 1989 to 15 percent in 2001).

#### **Continued Gains in Faculty Support for Tenure**

In response to the on-going debate regarding the viability of the tenure system in today's changing higher education landscape, faculty support for tenure continues to rise. Table 5 shows





how tenure attitudes have changed among tenured and untenured faculty since 1995. Continuing a trend highlighted in the 1998 edition of *The American College Teacher* (see Sax, Astin, Korn, and Gilmartin, 1999), tenured and untenured faculty of all professorial ranks increasingly *disagree* with the statement, "Tenure is an outmoded concept," and increasingly agree that "Tenure is essential to attract the best minds to academe." The most ardent supporters of tenure continue to be those faculty who have already earned it, especially those at the higher ranks. Moreover, the greatest opposition to tenure today continues to come from untenured full professors (i.e., those with perhaps the least chance of gaining tenure). However, between 1998 and 2001, untenured full professors also show the largest increase in their support for tenure.


#### **Increased Focus on Diversity Issues**

Faculty are more likely than ever before to believe that American colleges and universities are committed to promoting multiculturalism. Between 1989 and 2001, the percentage of faculty who believe that their institution places a priority on creating a multicultural campus environment has increased from 40 to 54 percent (Figure 3). Over the same time period, the percentage of faculty who feel there is "a lot" of racial conflict at their institutions has declined from 12 to 8 percent.



A growing number of faculty also believe that their institution is highly committed to recruiting more minority students (51 percent, up from 47 percent in 1998).

Today, 91 percent of faculty agree that a diverse student body enhances students' educational experience, while 60 percent endorse enhancing students' knowledge of other racial and ethnic groups as a "very important" or "essential" goal for undergraduates. Since 1995, there has also been a slight decline (from 31 percent to 28 percent) in the number of faculty who believe that diversity yields underprepared students. Despite these changes, however, the faculty's *personal* commitment to promoting racial understanding has remained largely unchanged over the last twelve years, with approximately 60 percent of faculty consistently ascribing "very important" or "essential" significance to this pursuit. Moreover, as illustrated in Figure 4, distinct gender differences remain with respect to faculty beliefs about, and commitment to, diversity issues. Among today's faculty, women are substantially more likely than men are to indicate that promoting racial understanding is a "very important" or "essential" personal goal (68 percent versus 54 percent). Women are also more likely than men to agree that a diverse student body enhances students'



educational experience (95 percent versus 88 percent) and much less likely than men are to believe that diversity yields underprepared students (19 percent versus 33 percent).


Within their own institutions, the majority of faculty today also feel that women and minority faculty are treated fairly. Faculty of color are perceived to receive fair treatment by 88 percent of faculty; 85 percent feel that women faculty are treated fairly; and 75 percent believe that gay and lesbian faculty are treated fairly. Women are comparatively less likely than men, however, to perceive any of these historically marginalized groups within the professoriate as receiving fair treatment.

Increased awareness with respect to diversity issues is also evident in the percentage of faculty today who report that many courses on their campus include feminist perspectives (36 percent, up from 29 percent in 1989). Between 1989 and 2001, there has also been an increase in faculty involvement with research and writing on women (25 percent, up from 19 percent) or race/ethnicity (24 percent, up from 18 percent). Compared with faculty in 1989, today's faculty are also slightly more likely to have recently taught an ethnic studies course (10 percent, up from 6 percent) or a women's studies course (7 percent, up from 5 percent). Since the question was first asked in 1995, the faculty's inclusion of readings on race/ethnicity (19 percent, up from 16 percent in 1995) and

women/gender (17 percent, up from 15 percent in 1995) has also increased slightly. However, despite increasing institutional attention to multicultural issues, the faculty's racial/ethnic composition remains largely unchanged, suggesting that institutions are generally making little headway in diversifying their faculty.

#### **Shifting Institutional Priorities**

Perhaps in response to intensifying calls for higher education to adapt to changing societal needs and expectations, we see a shift over the last dozen years in the faculty's perceptions of institutional priorities. Beyond the rising institutional emphasis on creating a multicultural campus environment reported earlier, the most pronounced changes are a declining emphasis on prestige and a growing emphasis on facilitating students' involvement in community service (Figure 5). Increasing or maintaining institutional prestige is viewed as an institutional priority by 59 percent of faculty in 2001 (sharply down from 75 percent in 1989). Today, 38 percent of faculty perceive a strong institutional emphasis on community service involvement (up from 23 percent in 1989). Since 1989, faculty have also reported increasing emphasis within their institutions on



developing a sense of community among students and faculty; in 2001, 48 percent of faculty view community building among students and faculty as a high institutional priority (up from 41 percent in 1989).

Many faculty today also report that during the past two years they have been at least minimally involved in institutional efforts to reform: the curriculum (85 percent); general education (70 percent); overall institutional mission or purpose (63 percent); faculty roles and rewards (62 percent); and governance (56 percent). Increased faculty investment in institutional issues is reflected further in the number of faculty today (85 percent) who indicate that their colleagues are committed to the welfare of the institution (up from 76 percent in 1989). Faculty are also increasingly likely to regard "being a good colleague" as an important personal objective (90 percent today, up from 80 percent in 1989) and increasingly less likely to be engaged in professional pursuits outside their institutions. For example, in 2001, 38 percent of faculty had served as a paid consultant in the last two years (down from 46 percent in 1989).

#### Faculty Place Less Personal Value on Social Concerns and Status Attainment

Compared with their counterparts in 1989, today's faculty place less personal priority on: becoming involved in programs to clean up the environment (32 percent, down from 44 percent); influencing social values (38 percent, down from 47 percent); influencing the political structure (15 percent, down from 20 percent); and helping others in difficulty (64 percent, down from 67 percent) (Table 6). They are also less inclined to value developing a meaningful philosophy of life (76 percent, down from 81 percent).

Faculty also continue to be increasingly less status oriented. Compared with faculty in 1989, today's faculty place less value on obtaining recognition from their colleagues (44 percent, down from 53 percent) and becoming an authority in their field (53 percent, down from 66 percent). While men and women faculty in 1989 were equally status oriented, women have shown comparatively greater declines over time with respect to the value placed on these external indicators of career achievement.

As shown in Table 6, personal commitment to being very well-off financially and raising a family remains largely unchanged. However, gender differences over time are evident. Compared with their same-sex faculty peers in 1989, women today place increasing value on raising a family

(66 percent, up from 61 percent) while men place increasing emphasis on being very well-off financially (40 percent, up from 36 percent).

#### **Work Satisfaction and Stress**

Compared with faculty in the 1980s and 1990s, today's faculty have somewhat more favorable attitudes toward their work. Currently, 77 percent are satisfied with their jobs (up from 75 percent in 1998 and 69 percent in 1989). Affective response to relationships with administrators and the quality of students has also improved. Currently, 60 percent are satisfied with their relationships with campus administrators (up from 52 percent in 1989); 44 percent are satisfied with the quality of students at their institution (up from 38 percent in 1989). Faculty today are also somewhat more satisfied with their opportunities for scholarly pursuits (61 percent, up from 45 percent in 1989).

Satisfaction with the competency of one's colleagues, however, has remained relatively constant since 1995 (with approximately 75 percent of faculty indicating that they are satisfied).

Despite expressing greater overall professional satisfaction, faculty today report greater work-related stress. In particular, today's faculty are more likely to experience "moderate" or "extreme" stress due to committee work (62 percent, up from 59 percent in 1998 and 56 percent in 1995) and faculty meetings (54 percent, up from 51 percent in 1998 and 50 percent in 1989). These increases may be attributable to the increasing internal and external pressures on higher education as a system coupled with intensified faculty involvement in institutional reform efforts reported earlier in this report.

#### **Summary**

This report is based on survey data collected in 2001–02 from a national sample of 32,840 faculty members at 358 colleges, universities, and community colleges. Data have been weighted to approximate the results that would have been obtained if all college faculty in all accredited institutions across the country had responded. Following are some of the survey highlights:

- There has been increasing polarization over the years in the political views of faculty.
   Women, in particular, show a disproportionate movement toward "liberal" or "far left" ideologies.
- Compared to faculty in the late 1980s, today's faculty are comparatively more attentive to students' academic and personal problems. However, while there have been notable increases over time in the value faculty place on the professional development of undergraduate students, the emphasis they place on students' personal development and civic engagement has remained relatively unchanged since the mid-1990s.
- Faculty use of computer and machine-aided instruction continues to rise, with half of all
  faculty using the internet to place or collect assignments. Today's faculty are also more
  likely to use "student-centered" instructional methods and to incorporate more writing
  activities across the undergraduate curriculum.
- In recent years, faculty of all ranks have become increasingly supportive of tenure regardless of their tenure status. Not surprisingly, the strongest advocates for the tenure system continue to be the most highly-ranked tenured faculty.

- More faculty than in any previous survey report that their institution is committed to promoting multiculturalism. However, distinct gender differences remain with respect to faculty beliefs about, and commitment to, diversity issues, with women being more committed than men.
- Nearly half of faculty today view building a sense of community among students and faculty as a high institutional priority. Perceptions of institutional focus on facilitating students' involvement in community service are also increasing, while the emphasis placed on increasing or maintaining institutional prestige is decreasing.
- Relative to their colleagues in the 1980s and 1990s, today's faculty are slightly less
  inclined to place high personal value on social concerns. They are also less focused on status attainment.
- Overall, faculty today have very positive attitudes toward their work. However, perhaps
  as a reflection of their greater involvement in institutional issues during challenging times
  for higher education, they also report higher levels of work-related stress.

#### Research Methodology

#### Administering the Survey

Letters of invitation to participate in the survey were sent to the chief academic and institutional research officers at more than 2,600 institutions nationwide. Of the total population of institutions who were invited, 379 institutions agreed to administer the survey. Each participating institution then provided HERI with the names and addresses of those persons who the institution wanted surveyed. The great majority of the persons were full-time faculty. However, some institutions also chose to survey their academic administrators or persons with academic appointments but no teaching duties. (To secure a reliable set of normative data, HERI developed an algorithm for determining respondent type – See "Defining Faculty Groups," below).

HERI then prepared a survey packet for each potential respondent, including a copy of the survey instrument, a cover letter from the Institute, and a pre-paid return envelope. The packets were then mailed to each institution, which had the option to add a cover letter of its own, as well as instructions for up to 21 locally-designed questions. The packets were then mailed by each institution to its faculty.

After approximately eight weeks, HERI's processing center inspected the returned surveys and identified who had not responded. A second set of survey packets was prepared for the non-respondents and distributed to the institutions, where the mail-out process was repeated. After an additional ten weeks, all surveys were processed and the resulting data file sent to HERI for analysis.

As in previous administrations of the Faculty Survey, the distribution of participating institutions by type and control was uneven, with small private colleges more likely to participate than large public colleges and universities. To compensate for this imbalance, HERI conducted a direct administration of the survey to faculty at a supplemental sample of 37 institutions. Names and addresses for potential respondents were obtained from a company specializing in mailings to college faculty. Survey packets were prepared and distributed directly from HERI's processing center using the same two-wave administration process noted above. Because the survey packets did not include a cover letter from the institution, it was expected that the response rate would be somewhat lower for these institutions (as it was, see below).

#### **Survey Response**

Of the 134,905 questionnaires mailed out, usable returns were eventually received from 55,521, constituting a 41 percent response rate for all institutions, down from 43 percent in 1989, 42 percent in 1995, and 55 percent in 1989. As expected, the response rate for actively participating institutions was slightly higher (44 percent), while the response rate for the supplemental institutions was much lower (26 percent).

While it would appear that the 2001-2002 Faculty Survey response rates reflect the general decline in response to mail-out surveys (see Dey, 1997), it is encouraging to see that this decline is substantially less in actively participating institutions (down 13 percentage points, from 57 percent in 1989) than in the supplemental institutions (down 20 percentage points, from 46 percent in 1989). Clearly, the involvement of the institution, both in its administration and support of the survey, makes an important difference. In 2001 we also needed fewer supplemental institutions to balance the overall distribution of the sample by institutional type.

#### The National Normative Sample

For an institution's data to be included in the normative sample, HERI required that a minimum percentage of all faculty at that institution be surveyed. Total full-time faculty counts were obtained from the 1999 IPEDS Faculty Salary and Tenure survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Education. Participating two- and four-year colleges were required to have surveyed at least 35 percent of their full-time faculty. Participating universities were required to survey at least 25 percent. To reflect the lower response rate from the supplemental sample of institutions, the minimum percentage was five points lower (30 and 20 percent respectively). As a result of these requirements, results from 44 of 379 participating institutions, and 14 of the 37 supplemental institutions were dropped from the normative sample, leaving a total of 358.

Inclusion in the normative sample should not be confused with response rate. An institution's response rate depends on the number of *sampled* faculty who returned surveys. If the institution sampled only a small proportion of its full-time undergraduate faculty, it might not meet the norms requirements even if it had a very high response rate.

#### **Weighting Procedures**

In order to approximate as closely as possible the results that would have been obtained if all college and university teaching faculty in all institutions had responded to the survey, a multistage weighting procedure was employed following Astin, Korn, and Dey (1991). The first set of

weights was designed to adjust for response bias within participating institutions. The entire faculty at each institution was sorted into twelve categories representing all combinations of gender (male or female) and rank (professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, other). The ratio between the total number of faculty in the institution and the number of respondents in each category was used as the first corrective weight. Thus, if there were 20 female full professors and 10 of those responded, each of these respondent's weights would be 2.0 (20 divided by 10). This within–institution weight, which is designed to correct for any response bias related to the gender or rank of the faculty member, adjusts the total number of respondents up to the total number of faculty at the institution.<sup>2</sup>

To develop the second set of weights, institutions were sorted into 23 stratification cells based upon type (two-year, four-year, university), control (public, private-nonsectarian, Roman Catholic, Protestant), and, for four-year institutions, selectivity (defined as the average admissions test score of the entering freshman class). Within each of these stratification cells, faculty in all institutions in the population were sorted into the same 12 gender-by-rank categories described above. Data from all participating institutions within each institutional stratification cell were then combined, and the weighted number of respondents (using the first weight described above) was then determined separately for each of the gender-by-rank combinations. Thus, for each gender-by-rank combination within a stratification cell, we had two values: the total number of faculty in the higher education population, and the weighted number of respondents to our survey. The ratio between these two totals became the second weight, which was designed to correct for between-stratification cell differences in institutional participation. The final weight used for each respondent consisted of the product of the two weights (that is, the within-institution weight and the between-stratification weight).

Table A1 shows the total number of institutions and total number of institutional participants by institutional type, together with the total number of faculty members, faculty surveyed, and faculty respondents for each cell.

#### **Defining Faculty Groups**

As already noted, only those full-time employees who were engaged in teaching undergraduates were included in the normative data reported here. Full-time administrators, full-time researchers, or faculty members who teach <u>only</u> at the postgraduate level have been excluded. More specifically, a respondent was included in the normative data if one of the following conditions was met:

- 1) if he or she indicated full-time employment at an institution [question 2] **and** noted teaching as his/her principal activity [question 1] **and** either:
  - a) taught at least one undergraduate-level course [question 18 or
  - b) taught no classes at all in the most recent term (this last condition is included for faculty on sabbatical leave or those currently engaged in research full-time).
- 2) if he or she indicated full-time employment at an institution [question 2] <u>and</u> taught at least two courses in the last term [question 18], at least one of which was at the undergraduate level.
- 3) if he or she indicated full-time employment at an institution [question 2] **and** indicated that he/she spent at least 9 hours per week in scheduled teaching [question 17], but did not indicate any specific types of courses being taught [question 18].

It should be noted that HERI has received some comment from participating institutions that had surveyed *only* full-time undergraduate faculty, yet some of their respondents were classified as being of another respondent type (primarily "other"). Apparently, these respondents were misclassified because they had not responded to one or more of the key questions above. For the purposes of this report, however, HERI felt it preferable to not include them, to assure that those in the normative sample were positively identified as meeting the requirements for inclusion.

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# Appendix C

# The Precision of the Normative Data

A common question asked about sample surveys relates to the precision of the data, which is typically reported as the accuracy of a percentage "plus or minus x percentage points." This figure, which is known as a confidence interval, can be estimated for items of interest if one knows the response percentage and its standard error.

Given the large normative sample, the calculated standard error associated with any particular response percentage will be small (as will its confidence interval). It is important to note, however, that traditional methods of calculating standard error assume conditions which, as is the case with most sample survey data, do not apply here. There are also sources of error unrelated to sampling variability which should be considered in comparing data across normative groups, across related item categories, and over time. These concerns include:

- 1) Traditional methods of calculating standard error assume that the analytical sample was selected through simple random sampling. Given the complex, stratified design of this survey, where the normative estimates are based on responses of faculty at participating institutions, it is likely that the actual standard errors will be somewhat larger than the standard error estimates produced through traditional computational methods.
- 2) The wording of some questions in the survey instrument, the text and number of response options, and their order of presentation may be different for different faculty surveys. We have found that even small changes can produce large order and context effects. Given this, the exact wording of items on the survey instrument (which is produced as Appendix B) should be examined carefully prior to making comparisons across survey years.

Although it is impractical to report statistical indicators for every percentage in every normative group, it is important for those who are interested in estimating the precision of the data. Toward this end, Table C1 provides estimates of standard errors for norms groups of various sizes and for different percentages, while Table C2 provides confidence interval estimates.

For example, the normative data indicate that 21.9 percent of all faculty reported that they had conducted research/writing on race/ethnicity within the past two years. To obtain an estimate of the standard error<sup>1</sup>, we would first choose the column that most closely corresponds to that percentage, or "20%".<sup>2</sup> Next, select the row corresponding most closely to the unweighted sample size of the comparison group to find the appropriate standard error. The last column in Table A1 shows that the unweighted number of faculty from all institutions is 32,840. Thus, with a sample size of about 35,000 and a percentage that is close to 20, the estimated standard error would be .21.

To obtain an estimate of the confidence interval at the 95% probability level, follow a similar procedure to look up the correct value in Table C2. We would again use the value in the fifth data column ("20%") in the last row, or .4. In practical terms, this confidence interval means that if we were to replicate this survey a number of times, we would expect to find that 95 times out of 100 between 21.5 percent and 22.3 percent of the faculty would report conducting research/writing on race/ethnicity within the past two years.

#### **Determining the Significance of Differences Between Percentages**

Normally, confidence intervals are used to determine if the difference between two percentages is statistically significant. As an example, let us assume that a private university surveyed 455 of its faculty and found that 30.0 percent conducted research/writing on race/ethnicity in the last two years. Is this percentage significantly higher than the 25.8 percent reported for all private universities (n = 4,138)? To determine this, one must perform the following three steps:

- 1) DETERMINE THE CONFIDENCE INTERVAL FOR EACH PERCENTAGE.
- 2) ADD THE CONFIDENCE INTERVALS TOGETHER.
- 3) Is the sum of the confidence intervals more or less than the difference? If it is more, then the difference is **not** statistically significant. If it is less, the difference **is** statistically significant.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup>Since the distribution of the standard errors are symmetrical around the 50 percent mid-point, for percentages over 50 simply subtract the percentage from 100 and use the result to select the appropriate column. For example, if the percentage we were interested in was 59, 100 – 59 percent yields 41, so we would use the column labeled '40%'.

Applying these steps to our example, we find:

- 1. Consulting Table C2, the confidence interval for the 30.0 percent figure is **4.0** (the 30% column for a sample size of 500), and the confidence interval for the 25.8 percent figure is **1.3** (the 25% column for a sample size of 4,000).
- 2. 4.0 + 1.3 = 5.3
- 3. The sum of the confidence intervals is **larger** than the difference between the percentages (4.2), so the difference is **not** statistically significant.

Why is this so? Well, with a confidence interval of 4.0, we know that there is a 95% probability that the 30.0 figure is within the range 26.0-34.0. We also know that there is a 95% probability that the 25.8 figure is within the range 24.5-27.1. Because the ranges intersect, it is possible that the larger reported figure is actually smaller than the smaller reported figure. To be statistically significant, the figure reported for our sample university would need to be no less than 31.2 percent.

# Participants in the HERI Faculty Surveys 1989 - 2001

The following list shows the institutions participating in the five Faculty Surveys conducted since 1989. A participation status of 'P' indicates that the institution did participate, but was not included in the national normative sample. A participation status of 'N' indicates that the institution was included. An asterisk (\*) indicates that the institution was included in the survey as part of a supplemental sample by the Higher Education Research Institute, and was not an active participant. The respondent pool for these schools was obtained from mailing lists provided by a direct-mail company specializing in higher education clients, and the surveys were mailed directly from the Institute.

#### **Norms Status and Response Rate**

Determination of whether or not an institution was included in the national normative sample was accomplished by comparing the number of full-time undergraduate teachers who responded to the survey to the total number of full-time faculty at that institution, according to the latest available data from the U.S. Department of Education (which generally runs behind the survey year. Thus, the counts for the 2001 survey were based on DOE data from 1999). A two-year or four-year college was included if it had surveyed at least 35 percent of its total population of full-time faculty. Because the DOE data do not distinguish between undergraduate and graduate faculty, the requirement for universities was more liberal -- at least 25 percent of the full-time faculty.
