

#### **COOPERATIVE INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH PROGRAM**

The Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) is a national longitudinal study of the American higher education system. Established in 1966 at the American Council on Education, the CIRP is now the nation's largest and oldest empirical study of higher education, involving data on more than 1,800 institutions, 10 million students, and 250,000 faculty. To maximize the use of these data in research and training, the CIRP was transferred to the Graduate School of Education at UCLA in 1973. The annual CIRP freshman and college student surveys are now administered by the Higher Education Research Institute at the University of California, Los Angeles, under the continuing sponsorship of the American Council on Education.

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**THE AMERICAN FRESHMAN:  
NATIONAL NORMS FOR FALL 2000**

This is the thirty-fifth annual report of national normative data on the characteristics of students attending American colleges and universities as first-time, full-time freshmen. This series, initiated in Fall 1966, is a project of the Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP), a continuing longitudinal study of the American higher education system sponsored by the American Council on Education (ACE) and the Graduate School of Education & Information Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles. A recent report published by the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) at UCLA provides a summary of the data generated by the first thirty CIRP freshman surveys (see Astin, Parrott, Korn, & Sax, 1997).

The principal purpose of the CIRP is to assess the effects of college on students (see Astin, Panos, & Creager, 1966). During the past 35 years the CIRP has generated an array of normative, substantive, and methodological research about a wide range of issues in American higher education. A recent study of the higher education literature showed that CIRP publications and research based on CIRP data are among the sources most cited by researchers (see Budd, 1990).

The freshman data reported here are weighted to provide a normative profile of the American freshman population for use by individuals engaged in policy analysis, human resource planning, campus administration, educational research, and guidance and counseling. The data are also useful to the general community of current and future college students, their parents, and college faculty.

The survey instrument, the Student Information Form (SIF; see Appendix B), is revised annually to reflect the changing concerns of the academic community and of others who use the information. A major purpose of the freshman survey is to provide initial input information for longitudinal research. Follow-up surveys of individual students in each entering freshman cohort are routinely conducted two and four years after college entry. Comprehensive tabulations of the results of these follow-up studies are published regularly (see HERI, 1992). Longer-term follow-ups are conducted at various intervals depending on funding. The formal research model used in CIRP studies is described in Astin (1991). Longitudinal follow-up studies of CIRP students have been used in major studies of dropouts (Astin, 1975; Astin, Tsui & Avalos, 1996), campus protest (Astin, Astin, Bayer, & Bisconti, 1975), volunteerism (Sax, Astin & Astin, 1996), education and work (Bisconti & Solmon, 1976), student development (Astin, 1977; Astin, 1993), and minority participation in higher education (Astin, 1982).

The normative data presented here are reported separately for men and for women and for 26 different institutional groupings. The major stratifying factors are institutional race (predominantly black versus predominantly white), control (public, private-nonsectarian, Roman Catholic, Protestant), type (university or four-year college), and the "selectivity level" of the institution. (A complete discussion of the CIRP survey methodology, stratification scheme, and weighting procedures is presented in Appendix A.)


## **AN OVERVIEW OF THE 2000 FRESHMAN NORMS**

The 2000 freshman norms are based on the responses of 269,413 students at 434 of the nation's baccalaureate colleges and universities. These data have been statistically adjusted to reflect the responses of the 1.1 million first-time, full-time students entering four-year colleges and universities as freshmen in 2000. The sections that follow summarize the 2000 results as well as major trends in the survey since Fall 1966.

### **WOMEN CLOSE GENDER GAP IN COMPUTER USE, BUT LAG BEHIND IN COMPUTING CONFIDENCE**

Reflecting the growing reliance on technology in education, student use of personal computers has escalated in recent years. A record 78.5 percent of college freshmen report using a personal computer frequently during the year prior to entering college. This signifies a major increase in computer use, up from 68.4 percent last year and 27.3 percent when this question was introduced to the survey in 1985. Further, the gender gap in use has nearly closed, with 77.8 percent of women and 79.5 percent of men reporting frequent computer use in 2000 (see Figure 1).


Despite the closing of the gender gap in computer use, a new survey item suggests that women lag far behind their male counterparts when asked about their computing self-confidence: Women are half as likely as men are to rate their computer skills as



"above average" or "top 10%" relative to people their age (23.2 percent among women, versus 46.4 percent among men). This gap in self-confidence likely contributes to the fact that men are five times more likely than women are to pursue careers in computer programming (9.3 percent of men, versus 1.8 percent of women). While the gender gap

in computer confidence has always favored men, the gap among the 2000 freshmen is the largest in the history of the survey (see Figure 2).


Other gender differences in computing are found in questions related to Internet use. Women are less likely than men are to participate frequently in Internet chat rooms (17.1 percent of women, versus 23.4 percent of men) and less likely to report frequent



Internet use for "other" reasons or activities (47.7 percent of women, versus 57.7 percent of men). The survey also points to a marked difference in the amount of time freshman men and women devote to playing computer/video games: 35.4 percent of men report playing video/computer games for three or more hours per week, compared to only 9.6 percent among women.

#### ELECTION YEAR INTEREST IN POLITICS HITS RECORD LOW

In a continuing trend, the political engagement of entering college students reached an all-time low. Only 28.1 percent of entering college students are interested in keeping up to date with political affairs, compared with last year's record low of 28.6 percent and the high



of 60.3 percent in 1966 (see Figure 3). Further, a record low 16.4 percent of freshmen

discuss politics frequently, compared to 16.9 percent last year and a high of 33.6 percent in 1968. The percent of freshmen who voted in a student election also hit an all-time low of only 22.8 percent, compared to 23.9 last year and 78.7 in 1968. Although the 2000 results reflect a long-term decline in students' political interest, the persistent downward trend is noteworthy since freshman interest in politics traditionally increases during a presidential election year.

In terms of students' political orientation, the 2000 survey reflects the fourth consecutive increase in the percent of students identifying as "liberal" or "far left," which rose from 26.0 percent in 1999 to 27.7 percent in 2000. The movement to the left of the ideological spectrum resulted in fewer students identifying as "middle of the road" (51.9 percent, compared to 53.4 percent last year). The percent identifying as "conservative" or "far right" remained fairly constant between 1999 and 2000, but has generally declined over the past four years, and currently stands at 20.3 percent.

#### **FRESHMEN LESS DRIVEN BY STATUS**

Results suggest that responsibility, recognition, and authority are less appealing to today's freshmen. The percent of freshmen who feel it is very important or essential to become an "authority" in their chosen field dropped from 60.1 percent in 1999 to 59.7 percent in 2000, which marks an all-time low for this item and 19 percentage points below the item's record high in 1987. The freshman goal of obtaining "recognition from colleagues" is at its lowest since point in twenty-three years (51.2 percent), a full 9.3 percentage points below the item's high in 1987. Finally, only 36.9 percent of today's freshmen are committed to "having administrative responsibility for the work of others," another item that peaked in 1987 at 45.5 percent. Notably, declining interest in status and authority does not correspond to declining interest in affluence: 73.4 percent of today's freshmen are interested in being very well off financially, which points to a fairly stable trend in the past decade after a steep climb during the 70s and 80s.

#### **FRESHMEN INVESTING LESS TIME IN THEIR STUDIES, BUT EARNING HIGHER GRADES**

Today's freshmen are spending less time studying and doing homework than any previous entering class. Only 36.0 percent of entering college students report studying or

doing homework six or more hours per week in the past year. This marks the lowest figure since this question was first asked in 1987, when 47.0 percent reported studying six or more hours weekly.

Despite the reduction in time devoted to schoolwork, students' high school grades continue to soar. A full 42.9 percent of freshmen report earning "A" averages in high school, compared to 42.7 percent last year, and a low of 17.6 percent in 1968.

Conversely, the percent reporting "C" averages or lower remained at last year's record low 6.6 percent, compared to a high of 23.1 percent in 1968.

Escalating grades appear to translate into rising academic aspirations. The percent of students who believe that there is a very good chance they will earn at least a "B" average in college rose dramatically from 52.0 percent in 1999 to 58.1 percent in 2000. When this question was first asked in 1971, only 26.7 percent of freshmen anticipated earning "B" or better grades in college. The 2000 survey also shows that a record 20.7 percent of freshmen expect to graduate from college with honors. This figure compares to 18.3 percent in 1999 and a low of only 4.1 percent in 1967.


#### **ALCOHOL AND CIGARETTE USE DOWN OVER TIME**

Rates of beer drinking continue to decline among freshmen. Just 48.3 percent of today's students report drinking beer frequently or occasionally during the past year, compared to 48.6 percent in 1999 and a high of 73.7 percent in 1982. Frequent or occasional consumption of wine or liquor rose slightly between 1999 and 2000 (from 53.2 percent to 53.9 percent), but is far below the high of 67.8 percent reported in 1987. Similarly, the number of hours per week that students spend "partying" has remained relatively constant in recent years (currently 51.1 percent of freshmen reporting partying three or more hours per week), but is ten percentage points lower than when this question was first asked in 1987.

Also on the decline is frequent cigarette smoking, which dropped for the second straight year to 10.0 percent, compared to 10.7 percent in 1999 and a high of 15.2 percent in 1967. However, this year's decline in smoking represents a reversal of recent trends: between 1985 and 1999, the percent of students who frequently smoked cigarettes increased steadily from a low of 6.5 percent. Finally, although the survey does not ask

about marijuana usage, the belief that marijuana should be legalized stands at 34.2 percent, representing a significant liberalization of attitudes since the record low of 16.7 percent in 1989 (see Figure 4). Nevertheless, today's figures are significantly lower than the item's record high of 51.3 percent in 1977.



#### **DECLINING INTEREST IN MEDICAL AND HEALTH CAREERS**

Interest in medicine has seen a steady decline since it peaked on the survey in 1995. Currently, 6.0 percent of freshmen plan to become physicians, compared to 6.4 percent last year and a high of 7.6 percent in 1995. Similar declines are found in other health-related fields (e.g., nursing, physical therapy), with 5.4 percent of freshmen expecting to enter the health professions, compared to 6.2 percent last year and a high of 8.4 percent in 1995. Although not record lows, these recent declines are reflective of a general downward trend in the popularity of medical and health fields.

**Interest in Medical Careers**




A consideration of gender differences sheds some light on these figures. While the field of medicine has historically attracted more men than women, the percentage of women freshmen who plan to become doctors surpassed men in 1994, and this gap

continues to widen (see Figure 5). Currently, 7.0 percent of women aspire to become

physicians, compared to 4.8 percent of men. This contrasts to 7.1 percent of the men and only 2.4 percent of the women in 1971. Nevertheless, when it comes to interest in the health professions in general, women have outnumbered men throughout the history of the survey.

### RISING OPPOSITION TO DEATH PENALTY; GROWING SUPPORT FOR GAY RIGHTS

Freshman opposition to the death penalty rose sharply, with 31.2 percent agreeing that "The death penalty should be abolished" (compared to 26.7 percent in 1999 and 24.1 percent in 1998). While considerably lower than in 1971, when 60.2 percent agreed with this statement, the last six years attest to a reversal in the trend for this item, which had dropped to a low point of 21.2 percent in 1994 (see Figure 6).



In addition, agreement with the statement "there is too much concern in the courts for the rights of criminals" has dropped substantially, from 71.2 percent in 1999 to 66.5 percent in 2000. Although the trends for this item have not been as clear as those for the death penalty issue, they do show a drop of almost seven percentage points since the high of 73.2 percent in 1995.

Changing attitudes about the role of government also are reflected in students' growing anti-tax sentiment. A record low 52.2 percent of freshmen agree that "Wealthy people should pay a larger share of taxes than they do now," compared to 54.6 percent last year and a high of 75.8 percent in 1974.

Finally, the vast majority of college freshmen appear to be open-minded about gay rights. Only 27.2 percent of students feel that "It is important to have laws prohibiting homosexual relationships." This represents a significant decline from the record high 50.4 percent of students agreeing with that statement in 1987. Further, 56.0

percent of freshmen believe that “Same sex couples should have the right to legal marital status.” This marks the highest level of support for this item since it was introduced on the survey in 1997 (at 50.9 percent).

## Appendix A

### Research Methodology

#### DEVELOPING THE NATIONAL NORMS

The data reported here have been weighted to provide a normative picture of the American college freshman population for persons engaged in policy analysis, human resource planning, campus administration, educational research, and guidance and counseling, as well as for the general community of students and parents. This Appendix provides a brief overview of the CIRP methodology and describes the procedures used to weight the annual freshman survey results to produce the national normative estimates.

#### HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

From 1966 to 1970, approximately 15 percent of the nation's institutions of higher education were selected by sampling procedures and invited to participate in the program. As the academic community became aware of the value of program participation, additional institutions asked to participate. Beginning in 1971, all institutions that have entering freshman classes and that respond to the U. S. Department of Education's (DOE) Higher Education General Information Survey were invited to participate (see 'The National Population' below). A minimal charge plus a unit rate based on the number of forms processed helps to defray the direct costs of the survey. In Fall 1974 and 1975, samples of proprietary institutions also participated in the survey.

#### THE NATIONAL NORMS AND TWO-YEAR COLLEGES

Since the late 1980's, the number of four-year colleges and universities participating in the CIRP has been steadily increasing – reaching record numbers in 2000. However, the number of two-year colleges participating in the CIRP has dropped gradually but inexorably. Moreover, there has been increasing turnover in the two-year colleges that participate from year to year. The combination of these factors has resulted in ever-larger cell weights being applied to the two-year college data and increased the possibility of non-random variation in the overall national norms.

In 2000, the number of participating two-year colleges dropped to its lowest level ever, 32 out of 1,153 in the HERI population. Of these, less than half qualified for inclusion in the national norms. The very high weights that we would need to apply to these schools (well over 400 in some cases) would have posed unacceptable risks in charting trends in the overall norms.

As a result, we decided this year not to publish "norms" for the two-year colleges and to report National Norms for those institutions offering baccalaureate-level degrees – that is,

institutions HERI classifies as “four-year colleges” and “universities.” The trends reported in the text are thus for baccalaureate institutions only. However, before publishing the results in this report, we took some care to insure that the trends we have reported in the past for *all* institutions were also reflected in the trends for *all baccalaureate* institutions. For every item, these trends are the same. In other words, the past trends that we have been tracking and the trends for baccalaureate institutions are in all respects comparable for all higher education institutions.

We continue to welcome the participation of two-year colleges in the CIRP, and sincerely hope that in the future, their participation level will increase to the point that we can return to reporting norms for two-year colleges and trends for all institutions enrolling first-time freshmen. In the meantime, we are preparing a report of 35-year trends for the baccalaureate institutions, which will be available within a few months.

#### THE NATIONAL POPULATION FOR 2000

For the purposes of the 2000 CIRP, the population has been defined as all institutions of higher education admitting first time freshmen and granting a baccalaureate-level degree or higher listed in the Opening Fall Enrollment (OFE) files of the U.S. Department of Education’s Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS, since 1986 known as IPEDS—Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System). An institution is considered eligible if it was operating at the time of the HEGIS/IPEDS survey and had a first-time full-time (FTFT) freshman class of at least 25 students. In addition, a small number of institutions or their branches are included even though their separate enrollments were not available from the OFE files, because they were part of prior HEGIS/IPEDS populations and are known to be functioning with FTFT students. Generally, the OFE files available for any given year lag two or three years behind. The 2000 population figures, for example, were obtained from the OFE file for Fall, 1997. In 2000, the national population included 1,560 institutions.

It should be noted that the population reflects institutions of “higher education,” rather than “postsecondary education.” Most proprietary, special vocational or semiprofessional institutions are not included in the population. Beginning with the Fall 1993 survey, only institutions with regional accreditation (including provisional accreditation) were included.

#### INSTITUTIONAL STRATIFICATION DESIGN

The institutions identified as part of the national population are divided into 26 stratification groups based on institutional race (predominantly non-black vs. predominantly black), type

(four-year college, university<sup>1</sup>), control (public, private nonsectarian, Roman Catholic and other religious<sup>2</sup>) and the “selectivity level” of the institution. Selectivity, defined as the average composite SAT score of the entering class, was made an integral part of the stratification design in 1968. The selectivity figures were revised and updated in 1975, and again in 2000<sup>3</sup>. Figure A1 shows the distribution of institutions across the 26 stratification cells.

It should be noted that the dividing lines between low, medium and high selectivity levels are different for different types of institutions, as shown in the table below.

Changes in stratification assignment do occur; institutional requests for review are honored each year. Appendix D lists the current stratification cell assignment of all institutions that have participated in the CIRP freshman survey since 1966.

Having defined the population in terms of the stratification cell scheme, the OFE file is used to compute the male and female FTFT population in each cell. These population counts form the target counts of the weighting procedure

#### IDENTIFYING THE NORMS SAMPLE

Generally speaking, an institution is included in the National Norms sample if it provided a representative sample of its FTFT population. The minimum percentage required of a sample is based on the type of institution from which it was collected. For four-year colleges the minimum is 85 percent, while for universities, the minimum is 75 percent. Institutions whose



sample proportions were less than but close to these cutoffs are included if the method used to administer the survey showed no systematic biases in freshman class coverage.

Information about the FTFT population and the method of survey administration is obtained from participating institutions at the time they return their completed surveys. In the event an institution did not return FTFT information, counts from the most recent OFE survey are used. This procedure, although not optimal, is adequate unless the institution experienced a substantial change in its FTFT population changed since the last HEGIS/IPEDS survey.

#### THE 2000 DATA

Although 404,667 entering freshmen at 717<sup>4</sup> colleges and universities returned their forms in time for their data to be included in the 2000 norms, the normative data presented here are based on responses from 269,413 freshmen entering 434 baccalaureate institutions.

The normative data presented here were collected by administering the 2000 Student Information Form (SIF) during registration, freshman orientation, or the first few weeks of classes (i.e., before the students have had any substantial experience with college life). The SIF is designed to elicit a wide range of biographic and demographic data, as well as data on the student's high school background, career plans, educational aspirations, financial arrangements, high school activities, and current attitudes. In addition to standard biographic and demographic items that have been administered annually to each entering class, the SIF also contains other research-oriented items that may have been modified from previous years (e.g., see the list of attitudinal questions listed under item #29, Appendix B). The inclusion of modified items permits a more thorough coverage of student characteristics but also represents a compromise between two mutually exclusive objectives: (1) comparability of information from year to year which is required for assessing trends; and (2) flexibility in item content to meet changing information and research needs. Table A1 lists the 2000 SIF items and indicates previous survey years in which comparable items have been used.

The SIF, reproduced as Appendix B, has been developed in collaboration with students, professional associations, participating institutions, government agencies, educational researchers, administrators, policy makers, and members of the CIRP Advisory Committee. It is designed for self-administration under proctored conditions and for processing onto magnetic tape with a mark reflex reader. The SIF content is reviewed annually by the CIRP project staff, with the assistance of the CIRP Advisory Committee as well as others interested in the annual freshman survey program.

Four tape files are developed from the SIF each year: (1) an institutional summary file containing institutional identification numbers and an institutional summary of the responses for men and women; (2) a file containing individual responses and a student identification number, but no names and addresses; (3) a name-and-address file containing a second, independent student identification number; and (4) a "link" file containing *only* the two independent identification numbers. This last file is maintained under an elaborate system developed to ensure strict confidentiality of individual student data and to protect against misuse of the name-and-address file (Astin & Boruch, 1970).

Those data from institutions meeting minimal quality requirements for inclusion in the 2000 norms (above) were differentially weighted to represent the population of entering freshmen at all higher educational institutions in the United States (see 'Weighting the Sample' below). Part-time students and those who are not first-time college students (i.e., transfers and former enrollees) were excluded from the normative sample. Since the 1972 survey, special care has been taken to define these enrollment statuses; in surveys before 1972, the participating institutions were asked to exclude part-time students, while non-first-time students were excluded during the data processing stage by screening out those who indicated that they had previously attended college. Since that time, all students who did not identify themselves as part-time were included in the national norms if they either graduated from high school in the year of the survey or had never attended any postsecondary institution.

#### WEIGHTING THE SAMPLE

Those institutions identified as being part of the Norms sample are weighted by a two-step procedure. The first weight is designed to adjust for nonparticipation within institutions. Counts of the male and female FTFT population for each institution are divided by that institution's male and female FTFT respondent count. The resulting weights, when applied to each respondent, bring the male and female respondent counts up to the corresponding counts for the population at that institution.

The second weight is designed to compensate for nonparticipating institutions within each stratification cell. The weighted male and female counts for all participating institutions in each stratification cell are first summed, and then are divided into the national male and female FTFT counts for all institutions in that stratification cell, producing a second set of ("cell") weights. The final weight is simply the product of the first and second weights.

Weighting each respondent using this final weight brings the male and female counts for each stratification cell up to the corresponding national counts for all institutions in that stratification cell. The last two columns of Table A2 show the final weights that were applied to the 2000 data.

## COMPARISON GROUPS

Weighted data are combined separately to form various comparison (or Norms) groups. Most norms groups are hierarchically organized, allowing participating institutions to compare their results at different levels of specificity. A college assigned to stratification cell #14, for example, can compare its results with the following five Norms groups (in declining order of specificity):

- Private nonsectarian, very high selectivity
- Private nonsectarian
- All private four-year colleges
- All four-year colleges
- All baccalaureate institutions

Table A3 shows the 2000 distribution of schools and respondents across the 26 Norms groups printed in the annual *American Freshman* report, as well as a summary of distribution by national region. The weighted results reported here represent the “all institutions” group—the overall weighted summary based on all 269,413 respondents whose institutions were included in the national norms.

## RESTRATIFICATION

From time to time, HERI re-evaluates the distribution of institutions within the stratification cell scheme described above. While individual participating institutions have been reassigned on their representation of a change of their institutional type or selectivity, a full restratification (including all institutions in the population) was last conducted in 1977.

In 2000, HERI conducted a full restratification to more accurately reflect the distribution of the population among the various stratification cells, and to insure that individual institutions were assigned to the appropriate cell. In doing so, we addressed three issues:

- ***The actual change in selectivity of individual institutions since 1977.*** An analysis of new selectivity scores for some 1,500 baccalaureate colleges (collected in 1999) indicated that certain institutional types (such as universities) increased their selectivity across the board, and individual institutions increased (or decreased) their selectivity relative to other institutions in their stratification cell.
- ***The College Board “recentering” of SAT scores in 1995.*** This had the effect of raising the composite SAT scores of individual students taking the SAT in 1995 and later by as much as 100 points relative to those students taking the SAT in 1994 or earlier, even though they may

have performed identically on the test. The recentering required a recomputation of the dividing lines between the very low, low, medium, high and very high stratification cells within a particular institutional control/type.

- ***Better availability of selectivity information.*** In 1977, 178 institutions were assigned to “unknown selectivity” stratification cells. In 2000, the number has been reduced to 96.

As one might imagine, wholesale changes to the stratification cell scheme could well result in changes to the national norms that are in fact artifacts of those changes. To test the effect of restratification, a re-analysis of the 1999 National Norms was conducted, comparing results under the old stratification scheme against results computed from the new scheme. We found that the largest change in the results for all institutions was no more than 1.6 percentage points, with most changes being well under 0.5 percentage points. We deemed these changes to be acceptably low. Nonetheless, considerable care was taken in reporting trends in the CIRP results to insure that any changes noted were real, and not merely the result of the restratification.



## Appendix E

### The Precision of the Normative Data and Their Comparisons

A common question asked about sample surveys relates to the precision of the data, which is typically reported as the accuracy of a percentage “plus or minus x percentage points.” This figure, which is known as a confidence interval, can be estimated for items of interest if one knows the response percentage and its standard error.

Given the CIRP’s large normative sample, the calculated standard error associated with any particular response percentage will be small (as will its confidence interval). It is important to note, however, that traditional methods of calculating standard error assume conditions which, (as is the case with most real sample survey data), do not apply here. Moreover, there are other possible sources of error which should be considered in comparing data across normative groups, across related item categories, and over time. In reference to the precision of the CIRP data, these concerns include:

- 1) Traditional methods of calculating standard error assume that the individuals were selected through simple random sampling. Given the complex, stratified design of the CIRP, where whole institutions participate, it is likely that the actual standard errors will be somewhat larger than the standard error estimates produced through traditional computational methods. In addition, while every effort has been made to maximize the comparability of the institutional sample from year to year (repeat participation runs about 90 percent), comparability is reduced by non-repeat participation and year-to-year variation in the quality of data collected by continuing institutional participants. While the CIRP stratification and weighting procedures are designed to minimize this institutional form of “response bias,” an unknown amount of non-random variation is introduced into the results.
- 2) The wording of some questions in the survey instrument, the text and number of response options, and their order of presentation have changed over the years. We have found that even small changes can produce large order and context effects. Given this, the *exact* wording and order of items on the survey instrument (which is produced as Appendix B) should be examined carefully prior to making comparisons across survey years.
- 3) Substantial changes in the institutional stratification scheme were made in 1968, 1971, 1975 and 2000. These changes resulted in a revision of the weights applied to individual institutions between 1966 and 2000. Stratification cell assignments of a few institutions may also change from time to time, but the scale of these changes and their effect on the national normative results are likely to be small in comparison to other sources of bias.

Since it is impractical to report statistical indicators for every percentage in every CIRP norms group, it is important for those who are interested to be able to estimate the precision of the data. Toward this end, Table E1 provides estimates of standard errors for norms groups of various sizes and for different percentages<sup>1</sup> which can be used to derive confidence interval estimates.

For example, if the item we are interested in has a response percentage of 18.7 percent among students at all four-year colleges (a normative group that is about 115,000 in size), we would first choose the column that most closely corresponds to that value, or “20%”.<sup>2</sup> Next, select the row corresponding most closely to the unweighted sample size of the comparison group to find the appropriate standard error. With a sample size of about 125,000 and a percentage that is close to 20, the estimated standard error would be .113.

To calculate the confidence interval at the 95% probability level, multiply the estimated standard error by the critical value of  $t$  for the unweighted sample size (which, for all CIRP norms groups, will be equal to 1.96 at the .05 level of probability).<sup>3</sup> In this example, we would multiply the estimated standard error of .113 by 1.96, which yields .221. If we round this figure to a single decimal point we would then estimate our confidence interval to be  $18.7 \pm .2$ . In practical terms, this confidence interval means that if we were to replicate this survey using the same size sample, we would expect that the resulting percentage would fall between 18.5 percent and 18.9 percent 95 times out of 100.

## NOTES ON THE SAMPLE REPORT

The Standard Institutional Profile Report divides students into three basic groups, depending on how they answer question numbers 4, 5, 11 and 12 on the survey (see Appendix B). These groups are:

**FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME.** Students enrolled full-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

**FIRST-TIME PART-TIME.** Students enrolled part-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

**NOT FIRST-TIME.** Full- or part-time students who have had some college experience since graduating from high school.

The first section of a standard Institutional Profile Report (entitled "Total First-Time Full-Time) includes FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME students *only*. The first three columns summarize the results by gender for students attending the institution. The remaining six columns summarize results by gender for students in two comparison groups of increasing breadth (in the case of the sample, these are "public universities of high selectivity" and "all public universities").

The second section of the Report (entitled "Standard Breakouts", not included in this Appendix) includes results by gender for the FIRST-TIME PART-TIME and NOT FIRST-TIME (labelled "Transfer" on the report) groups, as well as results for all three groups combined. There are no comparative results displayed on this report, as the Higher Education Research Institute does not compute National Normative figures for FIRST-TIME PART-TIME or NOT-FIRST TIME students.
