

The Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) is a national longitudinal study of the American higher education system. Established in 1966 at the American Council on Education, the CIRP is now the nation's largest and oldest empirical study of higher education, involving data on more than 1,800 institutions, 11 million students, and 250,000 faculty. To maximize the use of these data in research and training, the CIRP was transferred to the Graduate School of Education at UCLA in 1973. The annual CIRP freshman and college student surveys are now administered by the Higher Education Research Institute at the University of California, Los Angeles, under the continuing sponsorship of the American Council on Education.

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THE AMERICAN FRESHMAN: NATIONAL NORMS FOR FALL 2001

This is the thirty-sixth annual report of national normative data on the characteristics of students attending American colleges and universities as first-time, full-time freshmen. This series, initiated in Fall 1966, is a project of the Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP), a continuing longitudinal study of the American higher education system sponsored by the American Council on Education (ACE) and the Graduate School of Education & Information Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles. A recent report published by the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) at UCLA provides a summary of the data generated by the first thirty CIRP freshman surveys (see Astin, Parrott, Korn, & Sax, 1997).

The principal purpose of the CIRP is to assess the effects of college on students (see Astin, Panos, & Creager, 1966). During the past 36 years the CIRP has generated an array of normative, substantive, and methodological research about a wide range of issues in American higher education. A recent study of the higher education literature showed that CIRP publications and research based on CIRP data are among the sources most cited by researchers (see Budd, 1990).

The freshman data reported here are weighted to provide a normative profile of the American freshman population for use by individuals engaged in policy analysis, human resource planning, campus administration, educational research, and guidance and counseling. The data are also useful to the general community of current and future college students, their parents, and college faculty.

The survey instrument, the Student Information Form (SIF; see Appendix B), is revised annually to reflect the changing concerns of the academic community and of others who use the information. A major purpose of the freshman survey is to provide initial input information for longitudinal research. Follow-up surveys of individual students in each entering freshman cohort are routinely conducted two and four years after college entry. Comprehensive tabulations of the results of these follow-up studies are published regularly (see HERI, 1992). Longer-term follow-ups are conducted at various intervals depending on funding. The formal research model used in CIRP studies is described in Astin (1991). Longitudinal follow-up studies of CIRP students have been used in major studies of dropouts (Astin, 1975; Astin, Tsui & Avalos, 1996), campus protest (Astin, Astin, Bayer, & Bisconti, 1975), volunteerism (Sax, Astin & Astin, 1996), education and work (Bisconti & Solmon, 1976), student development (Astin, 1977; Astin, 1993), and minority participation in higher education (Astin, 1982).


The normative data presented here are reported separately for men and for women and for 26 different institutional groupings. The major stratifying factors are institutional race (predominantly black versus predominantly white), control (public, private-nonsectarian, Roman Catholic, Protestant), type (university or four-year college), and the "selectivity level" of the institution. (A complete discussion of the CIRP survey methodology, stratification scheme, and weighting procedures is presented in Appendix A.)

AN OVERVIEW OF THE 2001 FRESHMAN NORMS

The 2001 freshman norms are based on the responses of 281,064 students at 421 of the nation's baccalaureate colleges and universities. These data have been statistically adjusted to reflect the responses of the 1.2 million first-time, full-time students entering four-year colleges and universities as freshmen in 2001. The sections that follow summarize the 2001 results as well as major trends in the survey since Fall 1966.

COLLEGE FRESHMEN ESPouse MORE LIBERAL POLITICAL VIEWS


The percentage of entering college freshmen who identify themselves as politically liberal reached a two-decade high in 2001. This year, 29.9 percent of entering college students label their views as politically "liberal" or "far left," compared to 20.7 percent who rate themselves as "conservative" or "far right." The overall percentage of today's liberal and far left freshmen increased from 27.7 percent last year and 21.0 percent in 1981, but is still notably lower than the all-time high of 40.9 percent recorded in 1971 (see Figure 1). The most popular political label continues to be "middle of the road" (49.5 percent, down from 51.9 percent last year).



The tendency toward liberalism among the 2001 freshmen is evident in their changing attitudes about a wide range of sociopolitical issues, including the death penalty, drug testing, and gay rights. For example, a record high 57.9 percent of this year's freshmen believe that "same-sex couples should have the right to legal marital status" (compared with 56.0 percent last year and 50.9 percent in 1997, the year this item was introduced). Further, only 24.9 percent of current freshmen advocate "laws prohibiting homosexual relationships," compared with 27.2 percent last year. This marks

a significant decline from the record high 50.4 percent of students who agreed with that statement in 1987, and a record low since the question was first asked in 1976.

Today's freshmen also express more liberal views about drug legalization and



drug testing. Over one third (36.5 percent) agree that "marijuana should be legalized," an increase from 34.2 percent last year and the highest since 1980 (the all-time high on this item was 51.3 percent in 1977) (see Figure 2).

Further, while 75.0 percent

of today's freshmen agree that "employers should be allowed to require drug testing of employees or job applicants," support for such practice is down from 76.5 percent last year, and is lower than any year since the question was first asked in 1988.

Over the last two decades, there also has been a steady increase in the percentage of freshmen who believe that "the death penalty should be abolished." This year, 32.2 percent of incoming college students advocate ending capital punishment, an increase from 31.2 percent last year and the highest since 1980.

RENEWED INTEREST IN POLITICS, ESPECIALLY AT THE POLITICAL EXTREMES

Following long-term declines in students' attention to politics, the 2001 survey shows signs of renewed political interest and activism. The percentage of students reporting that they frequently discussed politics in the past year rose sharply from a record low 16.4 percent last year to 20.9 percent in 2001. This represents the largest one-year increase on this item since the 1992 presidential election year. Similarly, the percentage of students who feel that it is "very important" or "essential" for them to keep up to date with political affairs rose from last year's record low 28.1 percent to 31.4 percent in 2001, marking the largest one-year increase since the 1972 presidential election year.

Looking more closely at these reversals, we find that the one-year increase in political interest was largest among students who more strongly identify with a political leaning (either to the right or left) (see Table 1). In other words, the relatively stronger interest in politics among students identifying as “far right” or “far left” became even more pronounced in 2001, perhaps as a reaction to the contested 2000 presidential election and its historic aftermath.



CONTINUED GROWTH OF STUDENT ACTIVISM

Questions related to activism and volunteerism reflect continued growth. Participation in organized demonstrations during the past year reached an all-time high 47.5 percent in 2001, compared to 45.4 percent last year and a low of 15.8 percent when this question was first asked in 1966 (see Figure 3). The 2001 survey also marks a record high level of volunteerism, with 82.6 percent of incoming freshmen reporting frequent or




occasional volunteer work, compared to 81.0 percent last year, and a low of 66.0 percent in 1989.

Contributing in part to this growing trend is the fact that students increasingly report that their high schools require community service for graduation (an

increase from 23.2 to 28.2 percent since the item was first asked in 1998).

MORE INTERRACIAL INTERACTION; INCREASED AWARENESS OF RACIAL ISSUES

A record high 70.0 percent of this year's freshmen report having "socialized with someone of another racial/ethnic group" in the last year, compared with 67.6 percent of



last year's freshmen. This year's figure reflects an almost twelve percentage point increase from 1992, the year this item was first introduced. As shown in Figure 4, women remain more likely than men are to socialize with people from racial/ethnic backgrounds


that differ from their own.

In addition, fewer of this year's freshmen agree that "racial discrimination is no longer a major problem in America." Agreement with this statement declined from 20.5 percent last year to 19.5 percent this year, following a high of 21.4 percent agreement in 1999. Enhanced racial awareness also is reflected by renewed growth in the percentage of entering college students who are committed to "helping to promote racial understanding" (31.5 percent this year versus 30.8 percent last year). The percentage of students who view this objective as "very important" or "essential" peaked in 1992 (at 46.4 percent), then dropped steadily to an all-time low of 30.0 percent in 1999.

Fewer freshmen today also agree that affirmative action in college admissions should be abolished (49.0 percent this year versus 49.9 percent last year). This marks the third straight decline in opposition to affirmative action, reaching its lowest level in the six years since this question was introduced.


SENSE OF HEALTH AND WELLNESS CONTINUES TO DECLINE; GENDER GAPS PERSIST

In a continuing trend, self-ratings in physical and emotional health hit record lows in 2001. The percentage of students who rate their physical health "above average" or in the "highest 10%" compared to people their age reached an all-time low of 55.2 percent. This figure compares with 56.4 percent in 2000 and 56.4 percent in 2000 and



a high of 64.3 percent in 1986. A similar pattern is found for students' self-rated emotional health: A record low 53.4 percent of freshmen consider their emotional health to be "above average" or in the "highest 10%," compared with 53.8 percent in 2000 and 63.6 percent when this question was first included on the survey in 1985. Further, the percentage of freshmen who believe that there is a "very good chance" that they will seek personal counseling while in college reached a 28-year high at 6.6 percent. This compares to 6.4 percent anticipating counseling in the 2000 survey and only 3.5 percent in 1989.

Gender differences on these items are substantial. A full two-thirds of men (66.8




percent) rate their physical health as "above average" or "highest 10%," compared with less than half of women (45.8 percent) (see Figure 5). This gender gap may relate to gender differences in time spent on physical activities:

58.9 percent of men report exercising or playing sports at least six hours per week, compared with 43.2 percent of women. In the area of emotional health, relatively fewer women than men rate themselves highly on emotional health (47.7 percent of women, compared to 60.4 percent of men) (see Figure 6). In addition, women are twice as likely to report feeling frequently “overwhelmed by all I have to do” (36.6 percent among women, compared to 17.4 percent among men).

RECORD NUMBERS OF FRESHMEN REPORT NO RELIGIOUS PREFERENCE


When asked to state their “current religious preference,” an all-time high 15.8



percent of students report “none,” compared with 14.9 percent last year and 6.6 percent in 1966. This trend parallels the growth in the percentage of students who report no religious preference for at least one parent: A record high 12.4 percent of freshmen describe

their fathers as having no religious preference, and a record high 7.8 percent report no religious preference for their mothers (see Figure 7).

With respect to attendance at religious services, results indicate that the percent who report “frequent” or “occasional” attendance has remained fairly steady (currently at 83.1 percent). However, when we examine only those reporting “frequent”



religious service attendance, we see a pattern of decline over time (43.6 percent in 2001, compared with 44.1 percent last year and a high of 54.1 percent in 1971) (see Figure 8).

The survey also shows a decline in the percentage of students who pray or meditate for at least some period of time each week (from 67.7 percent in 2000 to 65.7 percent in 2001). In a new survey question asking students to rate their level of "religiousness" as compared to the average person their age, 31.7 percent rate themselves "above average" or in the "highest 10%." This represents the second-lowest figure among all 21 self-rating measures.

BOREDOM AND TARDINESS SIGNAL RECORD LEVELS OF ACADEMIC DISENGAGEMENT

In a continued trend, today's college freshmen appear to be more academically "disengaged" than ever before. An all-time high 41.1 percent of students report feeling frequently "bored in class" during their senior year in high school, up from 39.7 percent last year and a low of 29.3 percent in 1985. In addition, a record high of 65.1 percent of students "came late to class" frequently or occasionally during the last year, compared to 64.5 percent last year and a low of 48.2 percent in 1966. Further, the number of students who "overslept and missed a class or appointment" rose from 35.3 percent last year to 35.6 percent in 2001, nearly doubling the rate of 19.6 percent reported in 1968.

Today's freshmen also report spending less time on their studies: Only 34.9 percent of entering college students report studying or doing homework six or more hours per week in the past year. This marks the lowest figure since this question was first asked in 1987, when 47.0 percent reported studying six or more hours weekly. Despite the reduction in time devoted to schoolwork, students' high school grades continue to soar. A full 44.1 percent of freshmen report earning "A" averages in high school, compared to 42.9 percent last year, and a low of 17.6 percent in 1968.

INCREASING INTRINSIC MOTIVATIONS FOR COLLEGE ATTENDANCE

Overall, the 2001 freshmen appear to be more intrinsically motivated to attend college than were their counterparts in recent years. Going to college "to learn more about things that interest me" remains one of the most compelling reasons for freshman attendance, cited by 77.8 percent of today's freshman as "very important" (compared

with 76.6 percent last year). The current figure is the second highest recorded, exceeded only by the all-time high of 80.9 percent in 1977.

Patterned increases also are evident in the importance today's entering college students attribute to attending college "to gain a general education and appreciation of ideas." Nearly two thirds (65.8 percent) of today's freshmen view this as a "very important" reason for going to college (compared with 64.5 percent last year). This figure remains notably lower than it was in the late 1970s and early 1980s, when it was common for 70 percent or more of freshman to cite general education and appreciation of ideas as a very important reason for college attendance. Nevertheless, today's percentage is higher than it has been since 1993 (66.8 percent). More of today's freshman also cite the importance of attending college "to make me a more cultured person" (42.0 percent this year versus 40.5 percent last year), reaching the highest level since 1995.

The most marked decline in reasons for attending college is "my parents wanted me to go" (33.3 percent indicated this as a "very important" reason this year compared with 35.7 percent last year and the high point of 37.4 percent in 1996). Still, parents continue to play a notably more significant role today in shaping students' decisions to go to college than they did in 1971, when only 23.0 percent of freshmen cited parental wishes as a very important source of influence in their decision to attend college. There is also a notable decline in the perceived value of attending college "to be able to get a better job" (70.3 percent of this year's freshmen viewed this as a very important reason for going to college, down from 71.6 percent last year and 80.3 percent in 1993).

It is clear that Americans have been profoundly affected by the tragic events of September 11. Because administration of the CIRP occurs anywhere from mid-Spring to well into October, we at HERI were concerned that students completing the survey after 9/11 might have such different responses from those completing the survey before 9/11 that the national norms would be affected in unpredictable ways.

To determine any possible effect, we asked our participating institutions when they administered the survey – before 9/11, after 9/11 or both. We found that such a small percentage of institutions administered the survey after 9/11 (accounting for about

2.5% of the normative data), that even if there were significant differences in response patterns, they would have little effect on the overall results. Even so, the HERI staff is currently conducting analyses to detect if this small percentage of respondents differ in their answers from the 97.5 percent of students who completed the questionnaire before 9/11.

These notes refer to report items that are followed by numbers in [brackets].

- [1] Percentages will sum to more than 100.0 if any student marked more than one category.
- [2] Results may not compare to those of previous years due to changes in response options:
“American Indian” changed to “American Indian/Alaska Native”;
“Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander” added after “Asian American/Asian”.
- [3] This item included for the first time in 2001.
- [4] Results may not be comparable due to the addition of “Religiousness” self-rating.
- [5] Based on the curriculum recommendations of the National Commission on Excellence in Education.
- [6] Percentage reporting “frequently” only. Results for other items in this group represent the percentage responding “frequently” OR “occasionally.”
- [7] Results are not comparable to those for 2000, but are comparable to those for 1999 and earlier.
- [8] Please note that three categories (laborer, semi-skilled worker, unemployed) have been added in 2001 to make this item consistent with parents’ occupation.
- [9] Recategorization of this item from a longer list is shown in Appendix C.
- [10] Starting in 2001, HERI has dropped the list of 20 individual sources of college funding in favor of this condensed list.

The data reported here have been weighted to provide a normative picture of the American college freshman population for persons engaged in policy analysis, human resource planning, campus administration, educational research, and guidance and counseling, as well as for the general community of students and parents. This Appendix provides a brief overview of the CIRP methodology and describes the procedures used to weight the annual freshman survey results to produce the national normative estimates.


HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

From 1966 to 1970, approximately 15 percent of the nation's institutions of higher education were selected by sampling procedures and invited to participate in the program. As the academic community became aware of the value of program participation, additional institutions asked to participate. Beginning in 1971, all institutions that have entering freshman classes and that respond to the U. S. Department of Education's (DOE) Higher Education General Information Survey were invited to participate (see 'The National Population' below). A minimal charge plus a unit rate based on the number of forms processed helps to defray the direct costs of the survey. In Fall 1974 and 1975, samples of proprietary institutions also participated in the survey.

THE NATIONAL POPULATION FOR 2001

For the purposes of the 2001 CIRP, the population has been defined as all institutions of higher education admitting first time freshmen and granting a baccalaureate-level degree or higher listed in the Opening Fall Enrollment (OFE) files of the U.S. Department of Education's Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS, since 1986 known as IPEDS—Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System). An institution is considered eligible if it was operating at the time of the HEGIS/IPEDS survey and had a first-time full-time (FTFT) freshman class of at least 25 students. In addition, a small number of institutions or their branches are included even though their separate enrollments were not available from the OFE files, because they were part of prior HEGIS/IPEDS populations and are known to be functioning with FTFT students. The 2001 population figures were obtained from the on-line OFE Survey for Fall, 2000. In 2001, the national population included 1,521 institutions.

Selectivity (SEL), used to define strata for four-year colleges and universities, is an estimate of the mean score of entering freshmen on the Verbal plus Mathematical portions of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (or the converted Sat Math and Verbal equivalents from the American College Test composite). The method of estimation is described in detail in Astin and Henson (1977).

The stratification design presented here is used to group schools to develop population weights and should not be used as a measure of institutional or program quality.

It should be noted that the population reflects institutions of "higher education," rather than "postsecondary education." Most proprietary, special vocational or semiprofessional institutions are not included in the population. Beginning with the Fall 1993 survey, only institutions with regional accreditation (including provisional accreditation) were included.

INSTITUTIONAL STRATIFICATION DESIGN

The institutions identified as part of the national population are divided into 26 stratification groups based on institutional race (predominantly non-black vs. predominantly black), type (four-year college, university¹), control (public, private nonsectarian, Roman Catholic and other religious²) and the "selectivity level" of the institution. Selectivity, defined as the average composite SAT score of the entering class, was made an integral part of the stratification design in 1968. The selectivity figures were revised and updated in 1975, and again in 2001. Figure A1 shows the distribution of institutions across the 26 stratification cells.

It should be noted that the dividing lines between low, medium and high selectivity levels are different for different types of institutions, as shown in the table below.

Changes in stratification assignment do occur; institutional requests for review are honored each year. Appendix D lists the current stratification cell assignment of all institutions that have participated in the CIRP freshman survey since 1966.

Having defined the population in terms of the stratification cell scheme, the OFE file is used to compute the male and female FTFT population in each cell. These population counts form the target counts of the weighting procedure

¹ For stratification purposes, we define a "university" as an institution that awards a certain minimal number of earned doctoral degrees. Institutions that offer postbaccalaureate programs but do not award a sufficient number of earned doctoral degrees are considered four-year colleges. The stratification design presented here is used to group schools to develop population weights and should not be used as a measure of institutional or program quality.

² This type of institution was labeled "Protestant" in publications prior to 2000. "Other Religious" more correctly characterizes the institutions that have always been in this group, which include all institutions affiliated with a religion other than Roman Catholic.

IDENTIFYING THE NORMS SAMPLE

Generally speaking, an institution is included in the National Norms sample if it provided a representative sample of its FTFT population. The minimum percentage required of a sample is based on the type of institution from which it was collected. For four-year colleges the minimum is 85 percent, while for universities, the minimum is 75 percent. Institutions whose sample proportions were less than but close to these cutoffs are included if the method used to administer the survey showed no systematic biases in freshman class coverage.

Information about the FTFT population and the method of survey administration is obtained from participating institutions at the time they return their completed surveys. In the event an institution did not return FTFT information, counts from the most recent OFE survey are used. This procedure, although not optimal, is adequate unless the institution experienced a substantial change in its FTFT population changed since the last HEGIS/IPEDS survey.

THE 2001 DATA

Although 411,970 entering freshmen at 704³ colleges and universities returned their forms in time for their data to be included in the 2001 norms, the normative data presented here are based on responses from 281,064 freshmen entering 421 baccalaureate institutions.

The normative data presented here were collected by administering the 2001 Student Information Form (SIF) during registration, freshman orientation, or the first few weeks of classes (i.e., before the students have had any substantial experience with college life). The SIF is designed to elicit a wide range of biographic and demographic data, as well as data on the student's high school background, career plans, educational aspirations, financial arrangements, high school activities, and current attitudes. In addition to standard biographic and demographic items that have been administered annually to each entering class, the SIF also contains other research-oriented items that may have been modified from previous years (e.g., see the list of attitudinal questions listed under item #31, Appendix B). The inclusion of modified items permits a more thorough coverage of student characteristics but also represents a compromise between two mutually exclusive objectives: (1) comparability of information from year to year which is required for assessing trends; and (2) flexibility in item content to meet changing information and research needs. Table A1 lists the 2001 SIF items and indicates previous survey years in which comparable items have been used.

³Including 11,116 entering freshmen attending 40 two-year colleges. As of 2000, two-year colleges are no longer included in the normative data. See "The American Freshman: National Norms for Fall 2000."

The SIF, reproduced as Appendix B, has been developed in collaboration with students, professional associations, participating institutions, government agencies, educational researchers, administrators, policy makers, and members of the CIRP Advisory Committee. It is designed for self-administration under proctored conditions and for processing onto magnetic tape with a mark reflex reader. The SIF content is reviewed annually by the CIRP project staff, with the assistance of the CIRP Advisory Committee as well as others interested in the annual freshman survey program.

Four data files are developed from the SIF each year: (1) an institutional summary file containing institutional identification numbers and an institutional summary of the responses for men and women; (2) a file containing individual responses and a student identification number, but no names and addresses; (3) a name-and-address file containing a second, independent student identification number; and (4) a "link" file containing *only* the two independent identification numbers. This last file is maintained under an elaborate system developed to ensure strict confidentiality of individual student data and to protect against misuse of the name-and-address file (Astin & Boruch, 1970).

Those data from institutions meeting minimal quality requirements for inclusion in the 2001 norms (above) were differentially weighted to represent the population of entering freshmen at all higher educational institutions in the United States (see 'Weighting the Sample' below). Part-time students and those who are not first-time college students (i.e., transfers and former enrollees) were excluded from the normative sample. Since the 1972 survey, special care has been taken to define these enrollment statuses; in surveys before 1972, the participating institutions were asked to exclude part-time students, while non-first-time students were excluded during the data processing stage by screening out those who indicated that they had previously attended college. Since that time, all students who did not identify themselves as part-time were included in the national norms if they either graduated from high school in the year of the survey or had never attended any postsecondary institution.

WEIGHTING THE SAMPLE

Those institutions identified as being part of the Norms sample are weighted by a two-step procedure. The first weight is designed to adjust for nonparticipation within institutions. Counts of the male and female FTFT population for each institution are divided by that institution's male and female FTFT respondent count. The resulting weights, when applied to each respondent, bring the male and female respondent counts up to the corresponding counts for the population at that institution.

The second weight is designed to compensate for nonparticipating institutions within each stratification cell. The weighted male and female counts for all participating institutions in each stratification cell are first summed, and then are divided into the national male and female FTFT counts for all institutions in that stratification cell, producing a second set of ("cell") weights. (The last two columns of Table A2 show the final weights that were applied to the 2001 data.) The final weight is simply the product of the first and second weights.

Weighting each respondent using this final weight brings the male and female counts for each stratification cell up to the corresponding national counts for all institutions in that stratification cell.

COMPARISON GROUPS

Weighted data are combined separately to form various comparison (or Norms) groups. Most norms groups are hierarchically organized, allowing participating institutions to compare their results at different levels of specificity. A college assigned to stratification cell #14, for example, can compare its results with the following five Norms groups (in declining order of specificity):

- Private nonsectarian, very high selectivity
- Private nonsectarian
- All private four-year colleges
- All four-year colleges
- All baccalaureate institutions

Table A3 shows the 2001 distribution of schools and respondents across the 26 Norms groups printed in the annual *American Freshman* report, as well as a summary of distribution by national region.. The weighted results reported here represent the “all institutions” group—the overall weighted summary based on all 281,064 respondents whose institutions were included in the national norms.

Appendix E

The Precision of the Normative Data and Their Comparisons

A common question asked about sample surveys relates to the precision of the data, which is typically reported as the accuracy of a percentage “plus or minus x percentage points.” This figure, which is known as a confidence interval, can be estimated for items of interest if one knows the response percentage and its standard error.

Given the CIRP’s large normative sample, the calculated standard error associated with any particular response percentage will be small (as will its confidence interval). It is important to note, however, that traditional methods of calculating standard error assume conditions which, (as is the case with most real sample survey data), do not apply here. Moreover, there are other possible sources of error which should be considered in comparing data across normative groups, across related item categories, and over time. In reference to the precision of the CIRP data, these concerns include:

- 1) Traditional methods of calculating standard error assume that the individuals were selected through simple random sampling. Given the complex, stratified design of the CIRP, where whole institutions participate, it is likely that the actual standard errors will be somewhat larger than the standard error estimates produced through traditional computational methods. In addition, while every effort has been made to maximize the comparability of the institutional sample from year to year (repeat participation runs about 90 percent), comparability is reduced by non-repeat participation and year-to-year variation in the quality of data collected by continuing institutional participants. While the CIRP stratification and weighting procedures are designed to minimize this institutional form of “response bias,” an unknown amount of non-random variation is introduced into the results.
- 2) The wording of some questions in the survey instrument, the text and number of response options, and their order of presentation have changed over the years. We have found that even small changes can produce large order and context effects. Given this, the *exact* wording and order of items on the survey instrument (which is produced as Appendix B) should be examined carefully prior to making comparisons across survey years.
- 3) Substantial changes in the institutional stratification scheme were made in 1968, 1971, 1975 and 2000. These changes resulted in a revision of the weights applied to individual institutions between 1966 and 2001. Stratification cell assignments of a few institutions may also change from time to time, but the scale of these changes and their effect on the national normative results are likely to be small in comparison to other sources of bias.

Since it is impractical to report statistical indicators for every percentage in every CIRP norms group, it is important for those who are interested to be able to estimate the precision of the data. Toward this end, Table E1 provides estimates of standard errors for norms groups of various sizes and for different percentages¹ which can be used to derive confidence interval estimates.

For example, if the item we are interested in has a response percentage of 18.7 percent among students at all four-year colleges (a normative group that is about 115,000 in size), we would first choose the column that most closely corresponds to that value, or "20%".² Next, select the row corresponding most closely to the unweighted sample size of the comparison group to find the appropriate standard error. With a sample size of about 125,000 and a percentage that is close to 20, the estimated standard error would be .113.

To calculate the confidence interval at the 95% probability level, multiply the estimated standard error by the critical value of t for the unweighted sample size (which, for all CIRP norms groups, will be equal to 1.96 at the .05 level of probability).³ In this example, we would multiply the estimated standard error of .113 by 1.96, which yields .221. If we round this figure to a single decimal point we would then estimate our confidence interval to be $18.7 \pm .2$. In practical terms, this confidence interval means that if we were to replicate this survey using the same size sample, we would expect that the resulting percentage would fall between 18.5 percent and 18.9 percent 95 times out of 100.

NOTES ON THE SAMPLE REPORT

The Standard Institutional Profile Report divides students into three basic groups, depending on how they answer question numbers 4, 5, 11 and 12 on the survey (see Appendix B). These groups are:

FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME. Students enrolled full-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

FIRST-TIME PART-TIME. Students enrolled part-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

NOT FIRST-TIME. Full- or part-time students who have had some college experience since graduating from high school.

The first section of a standard Institutional Profile Report (entitled "Total First-Time Full-Time) includes FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME students *only*. The first three columns summarize the results by gender for students attending the institution. The remaining six columns summarize results by gender for students in two comparison groups of increasing breadth (in the case of the sample, these are "public universities of high selectivity" and "all public universities").

The second section of the Report (entitled "Standard Breakouts", not included in this Appendix) includes results by gender for the FIRST-TIME PART-TIME and NOT FIRST-TIME (labelled "Transfer" on the report) groups, as well as results for all three groups combined. There are no comparative results displayed on this report, as the Higher Education Research Institute does not compute National Normative figures for FIRST-TIME PART-TIME or NOT-FIRST TIME students.
