

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## **THE AMERICAN FRESHMAN: NATIONAL NORMS FOR FALL 2005**

This is the fortieth annual report of national normative data on the characteristics of students attending American colleges and universities as first-time, full-time freshmen. This series, initiated in Fall 1966, is a project of the Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP), a continuing longitudinal study of the American higher education system housed at the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) in the Graduate School of Education & Information Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles. During the past 40 years the CIRP has generated an array of normative, substantive, and methodological research about a wide range of issues in American higher education. Recent publications provide a summary of the long-term trends generated by these data for college students (see Astin, Oseguera, Sax, & Korn, 2002; Sax, 2003; Allen, Jayakumar, Griffin, Korn & Hurtado, 2005). The survey instrument (see Appendix B) is revised annually to reflect the changing concerns of the academic community and of others who use the information.

The data reported here are weighted to provide a normative profile of the American freshman population for use by individuals engaged in policy analysis, human resource planning, campus administration, educational research,

and guidance and counseling. The data are also useful to the general community of current and future college students, their parents, and college faculty.

A major purpose of the CIRP is to provide initial input information for longitudinal research. HERI annually conducts two additional CIRP surveys that enable institutions to follow up on their Freshman Survey respondents: Your First College Year (YFCY), which surveys students at the end of the first year of college, and the College Student Survey (CSS), which surveys students at any year in college. Longitudinal follow-up studies of CIRP students have been used in major studies of retention (Astin & Oseguera, 2002), community service and citizenship (Astin & Sax, 1998; Sax, 2004; Vogelgesang & Astin, 2000), institutional transformation (Astin, Keup, & Lindholm, 2001), first-year adjustment (Keup & Stolzenberg, 2004), the science pipeline (Sax, 1994, 2001), diversity in higher education (Astin, 1982; Gurin, Dey, Hurtado & Gurin, 2002), and large-scale studies of student development (Astin, 1977, 1993).

The normative data presented here are reported separately for men and for women and for 26 different institutional groupings. The major stratifying factors are institutional race

(predominantly black versus predominantly white), control (public, private-nons sectarian, Roman Catholic, Other Religious), type (university or four-year college), and the “selectivity

level” of the institution. (A complete discussion of the CIRP survey methodology, stratification scheme, and weighting procedures is presented in Appendix A.)

## AN OVERVIEW OF THE 2005 FRESHMAN NORMS


The 2005 freshman norms are based on the weighted responses of 263,710 students at 385 of the nation's baccalaureate colleges and universities. These data have been statistically adjusted to reflect the responses of the 1.3 million first-time, full-time students entering four-year colleges and universities as freshmen in 2005. The sections that follow highlight the 2005 results as well as major trends in the survey since Fall 1966.

### American Freshmen Increase Commitment to Social and Civic Responsibility

The freshman entering class of 2005 shows a distinctive and widespread rise in attitudes reflecting social concerns and civic responsibility behaviors compared with previous cohorts. This is perhaps a reaction to the worst global and national disasters witnessed

in their lifetime. The Indian Ocean tsunami occurred during their high-school senior year and Hurricane Katrina hit the southern Gulf Region in August, as many students began college. Two out of three (66.3 percent) entering freshmen report they believe it is essential or very important to help others who are in difficulty, the highest this figure has been in the last twenty-five years, and it is a marked increase of 3.9 percentage points over last year (an increase of roughly 50,000 students nationally) (see Figure 1).

The beliefs of entering freshmen are reflected in a stronger commitment to action. An all-time high of 83.2 percent report that they volunteered at least occasionally during their high-school senior year and 70.6 percent report that they typically volunteered on a weekly basis. Also at an all-time high is the



percentage of students who believe there is a very good chance that they will participate in volunteer or community service in college, at 26.3 percent (a rise of 2.2 percentage points in one year). Adding those who believe there is some chance they will volunteer in college, this figure rises to 67.3 percent; only 8.2 percent believe there is no chance they will do so.

Students are not only interested in helping others through service, they believe it is important to personally take action at different levels. Approximately one in four students (25.6 percent) reports that it is essential or very important for them to personally participate in a community action program, an increase of 4.1 percentage points over 2004, the highest since 1996. An even larger number of students, 33.9 percent, find the goal of becoming a community leader essential or very important, an increase of 3.2 percentage points over last year. Larger still is the percentage of students who believe it is essential or very important for them to influence social values (41.3 percent), a figure that shows an increase of 3.0 percentage points over last year.


Not only is the rise in civic responsibility and engagement good for the communities in which these students live, but such activity is also correlated with improved practical and intellectual skills in the college years. Students' desire to influence society is associated with significantly higher scores on a standard test of the disposition to think critically,

perspective taking skills (the ability to see the world from someone else's perspective), and willingness to think complexly about other people's behavior (Hurtado, *in press*). Studies at the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) also demonstrate that participation in college-level service learning projects is associated with gains in student self-confidence regarding writing ability and critical thinking skills (Vogelgesang & Astin, 2000).

### **Support for Military Spending Wanes and Political Participation Increases**


**Figure 2. Federal Military Spending Should Be Increased**

Freshman support for military spending continues an annual downward trend, perhaps reflecting larger public concerns about the costs of the current war in Iraq. Two thirds of freshmen (65.8 percent) disagree with the statement that "federal military spending should be increased," and 63.1 percent agree with the statement that "only volunteers should serve in the armed forces" (see Figure 2). In the year after the events of September 11th, 45.0 percent of American freshmen supported increased military spending, whereas 34.2 percent express the same opinion in 2005. One new item on the survey revealed that 63.0 percent of freshmen believe that "dissent is a critical component of the political process." In addition, nearly half (49.7 percent) of all freshmen report that they participated in an organized demonstration during high school, the highest percentage in the survey's history.

More than a third (36.4 percent) of freshmen report they believe it is important or essential to “keep up to date with political affairs,” a response that has rebounded to levels reported among freshmen in 1994 (see Figure 3). Some of this increased political involvement may be due to 2004 and 2005 election activity, as 12.0 percent of freshmen report they worked in a local, state, or national political campaign

during high school. Though the percentage is small and many students were not eligible to vote a year ago, it is the highest it has been since 1971, the year that posted a record 15.4 percent participation rate in electoral politics among entering freshmen. It may be that the issues are becoming more relevant to this age group, and new forms of political participation allow for more organized grassroots

involvement of young people using online technology (e.g., moveon.org).

### Drinking in High School at Record Low


The percentage of entering college students who report that they frequently or occasionally drank beer as high school seniors dropped to an all-time low in 2005 (see Figure 4). Moving down 2.1 percentage points to 43.4 percent, this figure continues to drop from the high of 73.7 percent reported in 1982, a drop of 30.3 percentage points. More men (49.1 percent) than women (38.8 percent) report drinking beer frequently or occasionally in their high-school senior year. While both sexes show similar declines from 2004 to 2005 (1.9 percentage points for men and 2.2 percentage points for women), over the past few decades the difference between men's and women's drinking patterns has become smaller.

While the CIRP pre-college beer drinking figures show a marked decline over two


decades, such high-school experience has not translated into a decline in heavy episodic drinking once in college, a figure that has remained fairly stable nationally at approximately 44 percent (Wechsler, Lee, Kuo, Seibring, Nelson, & Lee, 2002). HERI is currently designing follow-up studies to examine the nature of the onset of heavy drinking in college despite marked declines in high-school consumption.

### Declining Religious Participation, But Increasing Discussion of Religion


**Figure 5. Attended a Religious Service**

Overall participation in religious activities is high among American freshmen but there is evidence of decline in a number of areas. While 79.6 percent of freshmen report they attended religious services frequently or occasionally during their senior year in high school, this percentage has fallen steadily since a high in 1997 (85.4 percent) and has now reached its lowest point (see Figure 5). similar trend is evident with respect to the time that students devote to prayer or meditation. This item was first included on the survey in 1996, when 66.9 percent of students reported that they pray or meditate on a weekly basis; in 2005, this percentage declines to 62.6 percent. In addition, more than twice as many freshmen entering in 2005 report "none" for religious preference than did so in 1978 (17.4 percent vs. 8.3 percent, respectively).

Despite these declining trends in religious activities, more of the 2005 entering freshmen are spending time discussing religion, as 35.0 percent report that they frequently discussed religion during their senior year in high school, an increase of 5.4 percentage points over 2003, when this item was last asked (see Figure 6). Given current events in the Middle East, and national discussions concerning intelligent design and evolution, this increase may reflect


an increase in discussions about the political implications of religion in our time.

### **Men and Women Differ in Motivations for Attending College**

The primary reasons to attend college differ for men and women. Table 1 displays selected factors that were noted as essential or very

important in the college-going decisions of men and women within the current freshman cohort.

Men are more likely than women to report that they are attending college to be able to make more money (73.5 percent vs. 69.0 percent) (see Figure 7). Women's top reasons include "to learn more about things that interest




me" (81.4 percent), followed by getting training for a specific career (73.1 percent). Men and women are equally likely to report they decided to attend college in order to be able to get a better job (72.1 and 72.2 percent respectively). As reflected in Table 1, the biggest gender differences in students' college-going motivations are most prominent with respect to aspects of personal and intellectual development, with women more likely than men to cite gaining a general education and appreciation of ideas (71.1 percent vs. 58.3 percent for men), becoming a more cultured person (48.3 percent vs. 35.3 percent), and finding my purpose in life (57.4 percent vs. 35.3 percent). Substantial differences are also evident in the extent to which women and men prioritize attending college to prepare for graduate or professional school (63.5 percent for women vs. 51.3 percent for men).

### The Rising Influence of Parents and Other Adults in Students' College-Going Decisions

More students today report that they are attending college in part because their parents wanted them to go. Overall, 43.7 percent cite this factor as very important, up from 41.8 percent last year and nearly double the low of 23.0 percent reported in 1971 (see Figure 8). In addition, in 2005 more students than ever before indicate that living near home was a very important reason in selecting a college (18.7 percent). At the same time, the proportion of students who indicate that their desire "to get away from home" is a compelling reason for college going remains at approximately 22 percent. The 2005 figure (21.7 percent) is considerably higher than the low of 8.7 percent who expressed the same sentiment in 1978.

Apart from parental influence, encouragement from a mentor/role model has become

very important in influencing college-going decisions for a larger proportion of students today (15.8 percent) than ever before. Members of the 2005 entering freshman cohort are also more likely than their earlier counterparts to view the advice of high school guidance counselors (8.0 percent) and teachers (5.4 percent) as very important in their institutional decision-making process. The role of these school personnel becomes more important for students who did not have the benefit of information that may come from college-educated parents, as the next section reveals.

### **A Focus on First-Generation College Students**

Students whose parents have no education beyond high school are significantly less likely to graduate from college than their peers whose parents have at least a bachelor's degree (Astin & Osegueda, 2005). Since the likelihood of attending and graduating from college is strongly correlated with parents' education, first-generation students face challenges unlike their peers in traversing through the higher education pipeline. First-generation college students are defined as those students whose parents have had no college or university experiences (Billson & Terry, 1982; Choy, 2001). In spite of these challenges, the goal of increasing baccalaureate attainment rates necessitates a better understanding of first-generation college students' pre-college char-

acteristics, including their reasons for coming to college, their reasons for choosing their respective college, and their expectations about work and family in the early college years. The CIRP freshman norms data are uniquely situated to profile the college-going attitudes and behaviors of first-generation college students.

Within the 2005 norms data, about one in six (15.9 percent) students falls under the definition of first-generation college student, including 16.9 percent of all female students and 14.7 percent of all male students. First-generation students are more concentrated at public institutions (17.5 percent) than private institutions (12.8 percent) and at four-year colleges (18.5 percent) than at universities (11.9 percent). First-generation students come from homes with lower family incomes: 29.4 percent report annual family incomes below \$25,000 compared to only 9.2 percent of their non-first-generation counterparts. First-generation students also report lower high school grades, with 37.4 percent reporting a high school GPA of "A- or higher" while 48.3 percent of their peers report this same GPA category. These trends validate important demographic differences between first-generation students and their peers, differences that can help to understand other pre-college trends that are shown between these two groups.

Relative to their peers, first-generation students generally report that parents' role

models, teachers, and high school counselors were all important influences on their decision to attend college (see Table 2). Specifically, encouragement from a role model or mentor was a very important reason for going to college for first-generation students (20.5 percent) as compared to their peers (14.9 percent). Similarly, advice from a teacher or a high school counselor was shown to be more important for first-generation students (40.9 percent and 44.2 percent) than their peers (33.7 percent and 36.4 percent) in choosing their respective institution. These descriptive data indicate that first-generation students are placing more importance on family, role models, and educators in deciding whether and where to go to college.

Table 3 highlights selected financial considerations for students in their decision to go to college as well as various expectations and living plans for their college experience. In comparison to their peers, first-generation college students are more likely to report that their ability to get a better job (77.3 percent

vs. 71.2 percent) and make more money (76.4 percent vs. 70.0 percent) were very important reasons for going to college. Similarly, more first-generation students cite the cost of college and being awarded financial assistance as important reasons in determining which college they will attend. Related to their emphasis on financial considerations, first-generation students are more likely than their peers to think that there is a very good chance that they will get a job to pay for college expenses (55.1 percent vs. 45.2 percent) and expect that there is some or a very good chance that they will work full-time while attending college (36.7 percent vs. 24.7 percent).

Also noteworthy is that almost half (49.9 percent) of first-generation students chose to attend an institution within 50 miles of their permanent home, compared to only 35.5 percent of their peers. In addition, almost one-third (30.7 percent) plan to live off-campus during their first year of college, compared to only 16.0 percent of their peers. Their strong

expectations to work and live off campus do not portend well for enhancing the quality of their college experiences during the critical first few years on campus. Indeed, each of these behaviors is at odds with those practices (e.g., living on campus, more opportunities for campus involvement) that are seen as conducive for a smoother transition to college and a successful academic experience (Astin, 1993; Barefoot, 2000). First-generation students arrive in college with a unique set of concerns and expectations, and it is important

for institutions to acknowledge the exceptional needs of this student population in order to best facilitate a successful college experience. Understanding and validating their needs and concerns is an important first step towards the process of helping these students navigate the transition to college and helping them achieve their educational goals.

# Appendix A

## Research Methodology

### DEVELOPING THE NATIONAL NORMS

The data reported here have been weighted to provide a normative picture of the American college freshman population for persons engaged in policy analysis, human resource planning, campus administration, educational research, and guidance and counseling, as well as for the general community of students and parents. This Appendix provides a brief overview of the CIRP methodology and describes the procedures used to weight the annual freshman survey results to produce the national normative estimates.


### HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

From 1966 to 1970, approximately 15 percent of the nation's institutions of higher education were selected by sampling procedures and invited to participate in the program. As the academic community became aware of the value of program participation, additional institutions asked to participate. Beginning in 1971, all institutions that have entering freshman classes and that respond to the U. S. Department of Education's (DOE) Higher Education General Information Survey were invited to participate (see 'The National Population' below). A minimal charge plus a unit rate based on the number of forms processed helps to defray the direct costs of the survey. In Fall 1974 and 1975, samples of proprietary institutions also participated in the survey.

### THE NATIONAL POPULATION FOR 2005

For the purposes of the 2005 CIRP, the population has been defined as all institutions of higher education admitting first time freshmen and granting a baccalaureate-level degree or higher listed in the Opening Fall Enrollment (OFE) files of the U.S. Department of Education's Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS, since 1986 known as IPEDS—Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System). An institution is considered eligible if it was operating at the time of the HEGIS/IPEDS survey and had a first-time full-time (FTFT) freshman class of at least 25 students. In addition, a small number of institutions or their branches are included even though their separate enrollments were not available from the OFE files, because they were part of prior HEGIS/IPEDS populations and are known to be functioning with FTFT students. The 2005 population figures were obtained from the on-line OFE Survey for Fall, 2004. In 2005, the national population included 1,555 institutions.

Selectivity (SEL), used to define strata for four-year colleges and universities, is an estimate of the mean score of entering freshmen on the Verbal plus Mathematical portions of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (or the converted Sat Math and Verbal equivalents from the American College Test composite). The method of estimation is described in detail in Astin and Henson (1977).

The stratification design presented here is used to group schools to develop population weights and should not be used as a measure of institutional or program quality.

It should be noted that the population reflects institutions of “higher education,” rather than “postsecondary education.” Most proprietary, special vocational or semiprofessional institutions are not included in the population. Beginning with the Fall 1993 survey, only institutions with regional accreditation (including provisional accreditation) were included.

#### INSTITUTIONAL STRATIFICATION DESIGN

The institutions identified as part of the national population are divided into 26 stratification groups based on institutional race (predominantly non-black vs. predominantly black), type (four-year college, university<sup>1</sup>), control (public, private nonsectarian, Roman Catholic and other religious<sup>2</sup>) and the “selectivity level” of the institution. Selectivity, defined as the average composite SAT score of the entering class, was made an integral part of the stratification design in 1968. The selectivity figures were revised and updated in 1975, and again in 2001. Figure A1 shows the distribution of institutions across the 26 stratification cells.

It should be noted that the dividing lines between low, medium and high selectivity levels are different for different types of institutions, as shown in the table below.

Changes in stratification assignment do occur; institutional requests for review are honored each year. Appendix D lists the current stratification cell assignment of all institutions that have participated in the CIRP freshman survey since 1966.

Having defined the population in terms of the stratification cell scheme, the OFE file is used to compute the male and female FTFT population in each cell. These population counts form the target counts of the weighting procedure

<sup>1</sup> For stratification purposes, we define a “university” as an institution that awards a certain minimal number of earned doctoral degrees. Institutions that offer postbaccalaureate programs but do not award a sufficient number of doctoral degrees are considered four-year colleges. The stratification design presented here is used to group schools to develop population weights and should not be used as a measure of institutional or program quality.

<sup>2</sup> This type of institution was labeled “Protestant” in publications prior to 2000. “Other Religious” more correctly characterizes the institutions that have always been in this group, which include all institutions affiliated with a religion other than Roman Catholic.

## IDENTIFYING THE NORMS SAMPLE

Generally speaking, an institution is included in the National Norms sample if it provided a representative sample of its FTFT population. The minimum percentage required of a sample is based on the type of institution from which it was collected. For four-year colleges the minimum is 85 percent, while for universities, the minimum is 75 percent. Institutions whose sample proportions were less than but close to these cutoffs are included if the method used to administer the survey showed no systematic biases in freshman class coverage.

Information about the FTFT population and the method of survey administration is obtained from participating institutions at the time they return their completed surveys. In the event an institution did not return FTFT information, counts from the most recent OFE survey are used. This procedure, although not optimal, is adequate unless the institution experienced a substantial change in its FTFT population since the last HEGIS/IPEDS survey.

## THE 2005 DATA

Although 377,981 respondents at 592 colleges and universities<sup>3</sup> returned their forms in time for their data to be included in the 2005 norms, the normative data presented here are based on responses from 263,710 FTFT freshmen entering 385 baccalaureate institutions.

The normative data presented here were collected by administering the 2005 Student Information Form (SIF) during registration, freshman orientation, or the first few weeks of classes (i.e., before the students have had any substantial experience with college life). The SIF is designed to elicit a wide range of biographic and demographic data, as well as data on the student's high school background, career plans, educational aspirations, financial arrangements, high school activities, and current attitudes. In addition to standard biographic and demographic items that have been administered annually to each entering class, the SIF also contains other research-oriented items that may have been modified from previous years (e.g., see the list of attitudinal questions listed under item #33, Appendix B). The inclusion of modified items permits a more thorough coverage of student characteristics but also represents a compromise between two mutually exclusive objectives: (1) comparability of information from year to year which is required for assessing trends; and (2) flexibility in item content to meet changing information and research needs. Table A1 lists the 2005 SIF items and indicates previous survey years in which comparable items have been used.

The SIF, reproduced as Appendix B, has been developed in collaboration with students, professional associations, participating institutions, government agencies, educational researchers, administrators, policy makers, and members of the CIRP Advisory Committee. It is designed for self-administration under proctored conditions and for processing onto magnetic tape with a mark reflex reader. The SIF content is reviewed annually by the CIRP project staff, with the assistance of the CIRP Advisory Committee as well as others interested in the annual freshman survey program.

Four data files are developed from the SIF each year: (1) an institutional summary file containing institutional identification numbers and an institutional summary of the responses for men and women; (2) a file containing individual responses and a student identification number, but no names and addresses; (3) a name-and-address file containing a second, independent student identification number; and (4) a "link" file containing *only* the two independent identification numbers. This last file is maintained under an elaborate system developed to ensure strict confidentiality of individual student data and to protect against misuse of the name-and-address file (Astin & Boruch, 1970).

Those data from institutions meeting minimal quality requirements for inclusion in the 2005 norms (above) were differentially weighted to represent the population of entering freshmen at all higher educational institutions in the United States (see 'Weighting the Sample' below). Part-time students and those who are not first-time college students (i.e., transfers and former enrollees) were excluded from the normative sample. Since the 1972 survey, special care has been taken to define these enrollment statuses; in surveys before 1972, the participating institutions were asked to exclude part-time students, while non-first-time students were excluded during the data processing stage by screening out those who indicated that they had previously attended college. Since that time, all students who did not identify themselves as part-time were included in the national norms if they either graduated from high school in the year of the survey or had never attended any post-secondary institution.

#### WEIGHTING THE SAMPLE

Those institutions identified as being part of the Norms sample are weighted by a two-step procedure. The first weight is designed to adjust for nonparticipation within institutions. Counts of the male and female FTFT population for each institution are divided by that institution's male and female FTFT respondent count. The resulting weights, when applied to each respondent, bring the male and female respondent counts up to the corresponding counts for the population at that institution.

The second weight is designed to compensate for nonparticipating institutions within each stratification cell. The weighted male and female counts for all participating institutions in each stratification cell are first summed, and then are divided into the national male and female FTFT counts for all institutions in that stratification cell, producing a second set of (“cell”) weights. (The last two columns of Table A2 show the final weights that were applied to the 2005 data.) The final weight is simply the product of the first and second weights.

Weighting each respondent using this final weight brings the male and female counts for each stratification cell up to the corresponding national counts for all institutions in that stratification cell.

#### COMPARISON GROUPS

Weighted data are combined separately to form various comparison (or Norms) groups. Most norms groups are hierarchically organized, allowing participating institutions to compare their results at different levels of specificity. A college assigned to stratification cell #14, for example, can compare its results with the following five Norms groups (in declining order of specificity):

- Private nonsectarian four-year colleges, very high selectivity
- All private nonsectarian four-year colleges
- All private four-year colleges
- All four-year colleges
- All baccalaureate institutions

Table A3 shows the 2005 distribution of schools and respondents across the 32 Norms groups printed in the annual *American Freshman* report, as well as a summary of distribution by national region. The weighted results reported here represent the “all baccalaureate institutions” group—the overall weighted summary based on all 263,710 respondents whose institutions were included in the national norms.



## Appendix E

### The Precision of the Normative Data and Their Comparisons

A common question asked about sample surveys relates to the precision of the data, which is typically reported as the accuracy of a percentage “plus or minus x percentage points.” This figure, which is known as a confidence interval, can be estimated for items of interest if one knows the response percentage and its standard error.

Given the CIRP’s large normative sample, the calculated standard error associated with any particular response percentage will be small (as will its confidence interval). It is important to note, however, that traditional methods of calculating standard error assume conditions which, (as is the case with most real sample survey data), do not apply here. Moreover, there are other possible sources of error which should be considered in comparing data across normative groups, across related item categories, and over time. In reference to the precision of the CIRP data, these concerns include:

- 1) Traditional methods of calculating standard error assume that the individuals were selected through simple random sampling. Given the complex stratified design of the CIRP, where whole institutions participate, it is likely that the actual standard errors will be somewhat larger than the standard error estimates produced through traditional computational methods. In addition, while every effort has been made to maximize the comparability of the institutional sample from year to year (repeat participation runs about 90 percent), comparability is reduced by non-repeat participation and year-to-year variation in the quality of data collected by continuing institutional participants. While the CIRP stratification and weighting procedures are designed to minimize this institutional form of “response bias,” an unknown amount of non-random variation is introduced into the results.
- 2) The wording of some questions in the survey instrument, the text and number of response options, and their order of presentation have changed over the years. We have found that even small changes can produce large order and context effects. Given this, the *exact* wording and order of items on the survey instrument (which is produced as Appendix B) should be examined carefully prior to making comparisons across survey years.
- 3) Substantial changes in the institutional stratification scheme were made in 1968, 1971, 1975 and 2000. These changes resulted in a revision of the weights applied to individual institutions between 1966 and 2005. Stratification cell assignments of a few institutions may also change from time to time, but the scale of these changes and their effect on the national normative results are likely to be small in comparison to other sources of bias.

Since it is impractical to report statistical indicators for every percentage in every CIRP norms group, it is important for those who are interested to be able to estimate the precision of the data. Toward this end, Table E1 provides estimates of standard errors for norms groups of various sizes and for different percentages<sup>1</sup> which can be used to derive confidence interval estimates.

For example, suppose the item we are interested in has a response percentage of 18.7 percent among students at all nonsectarian four-year colleges (a normative group that is about 49,000 in size). First, we choose the column that is closest to the observed percentage 18.7—in this case “20%.”<sup>2</sup> Next, we select the row closest to the unweighted sample size of 49,000—in this case “50,000.” With a sample size of about 50,000 and a percentage that is close to 20, the estimated standard error would be .179.

To calculate the confidence interval at the 95% probability level, we multiply the estimated standard error by the critical value of  $t$  for the unweighted sample size (which, for all CIRP norms groups, will be equal to 1.96 at the .05 level of probability).<sup>3</sup> In this example, we would multiply the estimated standard error of .179 by 1.96, which yields .350. If we round this figure to a single decimal point we would then estimate our confidence interval to be  $18.7 \pm .4$ . In practical terms, this confidence interval means that if we were to replicate this survey using the same size sample, we would expect that the resulting percentage would fall between 18.3 percent and 19.1 percent 95 times out of 100.

## **NOTES ON THE SAMPLE REPORT**

The Standard Institutional Profile Report divides students into three basic groups, depending on how they answer question numbers 4, 5, 14, and 15 on the survey (see Appendix B). These groups are:

**FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME.** Students enrolled full-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

**FIRST-TIME PART-TIME.** Students enrolled part-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

**NOT FIRST-TIME.** Full- or part-time students who have had some college experience since graduating from high school.

The first section of a standard Institutional Profile Report (entitled “Total First-Time Full-Time) includes FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME students *only*. The first three columns summarize the results by gender for students attending the institution. The remaining six columns summarize results by gender for students in two comparison groups of increasing breadth (in the case of the sample, these are “public universities of high selectivity” and “all public universities”).

The second section of the Report (entitled “Standard Breakouts,” not included in this Appendix) includes results by gender for the FIRST-TIME PART-TIME and NOT FIRST-TIME (labelled “Transfer” on the report) groups, as well as results for all three groups combined. There are no comparative results displayed on this report, as the Higher Education Research Institute does not compute National Normative figures for FIRST-TIME PART-TIME or NOT-FIRST TIME students.
